COLORADO EIGHT HOUR DAY.
Governor Peabody Not Ready to Call Special Session to Consider it.

Denver, Nov. 18.—Governor Peabody, of Colorado, is not prepared to answer the question propounded to him by the Denver Post. Would he, if the strikes now on in the state were called off at once, summon the legislature in special session for the purpose of enacting an eight-hour law?

"It's too big a subject to discuss off-hand," said he. The question has not been presented to me in that shape before, and, of course, I would not care to talk upon it until I had studied it somewhat.

"However, I might answer it in a way. Suppose I should call an extra session. What assurance would I have that the eight-hour bill would be passed and what assurance would I be given that in the event of the bill's failure to get through that the strikes would not be a once resumed?"

It was reported that the coal miners were circulating an extra session petition in the Southern Colorado camps, but the governor has received no information that the eight-hour movement had been revived.

He will not define his position on the extra session matter until he has been given some assurance from members of the assembly and labor leaders that it would result in a settlement of the labor difficulties of the state.

WOMAN SUFFRAGISTS.
Movement for the Ballot Growing in California.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 18.—Golden Gate Hall was filled with enthusiastic delegates today at the opening of the annual convention of the California Women Suffrage association.

The equal rights movement is gaining strength was evidenced by the large and representative attendance. The principal purpose of the meeting, which is to continue through tomorrow, is to perfect plans for the coming year's work of the association.

This evening a public reception is to be given in honor of Miss Gall Laughlin, the well known woman suffrage leader, who has been engaged in the work of organization in California.
