

Douglas Belts, President of Oregon Weelgrowers' Association, Urges All Stockmen to Attend Meeting of

National Association in January-It is Oregon's Opportunity.

Douglas Belts, president of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association, was in the city yesterday evening. from his home on Birch Creek, and reports the weather very favorable for feeding.

Mr. Belts says stock are in good condition to begin the winter, and the stockmen are very glad to see an early spell of cold weather, as it usually presages open weather, later in the winter or an early spring. Sheep on the foothills in the Birch Creek country are being fed now, and the frozen ground make it excellent feeding weather, as stock eat up all the feed thrown out, and none wasted as in "soft" or mude or muddy weather. of the National Livestock Association in Portland, Mr. Belts said he expected to go and take part in the deliber-ations of that body, and hoped to see a good attendance from this county and all Eastern Oregon as matters of vital importance to every stockman in the state would be considered at that meeting. He especially hoped that all king

would be fully repreof Hyerstinei ed at that meeting and expressed the wish to see cowmen from Eastern Oregon, as well as sheepmen, tending their assistance to the great work ahead of this, organization. At the meeting of this association in the East, the southern and south-

western cattlemen predominate, the delegates from this state have been principally sheepmen. He be-lieves the movement to organize and operate an Independent Packing Company, by the stockmen of the United States will be a great suc-cess, for the reason toat it is being liberally supported from all parts of the country.

The truth o the matter about the Independent Packing Company, is the stock could have been obthat tained in Kansas and Texas alone, without calling upon another state. but the promoters would not con centrate the business in this manner. but wish to see every state represented among the stockholders.

Mr. Belts thinks that Oregon stockmen should attend this meeting en masse, to show their appreciation of the honor shown the state, and to benefit from association with the leading spirits in the greatest dustry in the West, who will take part in the deliberations of that body. It will consider the questions that most vitually concern stockmen, Oregon stockmen will be able tand to hear these questions discussed by moving spirits, and able men, and will receive great benefit from meeting.

DOWIE'S VICTIMS. Australia Paper Tells of "Zionists"


Queer Actions, The Canterbury Times, published in Australia, has the following to say in regard to the actions of Dowle. "Zionist" before coming to the the United States.

"The Probate Court of Chicago has ordered Dr. Dowie to repay ten thousand sterling to the heirs 'd Frederick Sution, a New Zealander, of Dr. Dowle's converts "Rev. Alexander Dowle studied for the ministry in the Presbyterian church, but became possessor of pecullar notions of his own about re-ligion, and struck out a course for himself apart from the church, "He lectured through Australia and New Zealand about twelve or four-teen gunra and, and since then has exploited the United States with his peculiar doctrines as to the power of faith. "Frederick Sutton, a wealthy New Zealand admirer, is said to have come strongly under his influence, and when he died Dowle claimed that Sutton's fortune had been left to him as an endowment for "Zion church," that is, Dowle's church. The heirs at law, however, did not see eye to eye with Dowie on the subject, and pressed their claim in the United States courts, with the re-sult that the "divine Dowle" has to pay them £10,000, as above stated."




