De Wolf Hopper as Mr. Pickwick, is really the best comedian that has been seen at the Frazer this year, and in his support, Marguerite Clark as Polly, and Digby Bell as Sam, were very good. The stage make-up of Mr. Pickwick was ideal to the lovers of the character in Dickens' papers, and the English atmosphere of the play was perfect.

The choruses were not as sprightly as might have been expected from the advance advertisements, but several of them were new and excellent. "Boys Will Be Boys," and the "Potato Song," were especial favorites, and "Speak Low," by Florine Murry, as Arabella, was also well received.

The costumes in "Mr. Pickwick" were not so elaborate as in "King Dodo," and the lack of an orchestra with the company, was one of the marked deficiencies.
