Quotations on Staples Furnished by Local Merchants and

Hay is in demand this week, and several large purchases have been made at the prices quoted, with probably a small reduction for large quantities. An advertisement in the local columns of several hundred tons of alfalfa hay for sale this week elicited a dozen queries on the first day, showing the briskness of the market, and the activity in that line. Turkeys are not coming in as fast as has been expected by the dealers, and the Thanksgiving period is at hand. Chickens are also scarcer than usual at this time of the year, although there are enough to supply the local demand. No other features of the market are worth mentioning. It has been an uneventful week, from the grocer's standpoint.

THE WORLD'S SUGAR

OVER TEN MILLION TONS FOR THIS YEAR.

Cuba and Java Will Produce 45 Per Cent of the Cane Sugar in 1903-4—Beet Sugar Output Two Million Tons Greater Than Cane Crop.

The agricultural department, in its official crop reports for November, announces that the indications are that the world has entered on a new era in the production of cane sugar. The department quotes estimates, placing the total sugar production of the world in the year 1903-4 at 10,425,800 tons of 2,240 pounds each including 4,342,500 tons of cane sugar and 6,083,300 tons of beet sugar, and says as to the beet sugar: "During the past five years the world's output of this product has increased from 3,000,000 to more than 4,000,000 tons, quantitatively the greatest increase ever made in any five year period in the history of this industry. Moreover, for the first time in a half century, the ratio of increase in the world's production of cane sugar has exceeded that of sugar made of beets, the percentage of increase in the former product for the five years being about double that of the latter.

The four years from 1901-1904, inclusive, were each in its turn record breaking years for the production of sugar. The previous high record crop (3,539,000 tons) was that of 1894-95, the crop made just before the outbreak of the revolution in the most important producer, Cuba. "The high record crop in the history of the world's beet sugar production was that of 1902-03. Since that date there has been a decline in production in Europe, amounting in all to about 1,000,000 tons, but the present year's estimated output shows a considerable increase over that of five years ago."

The report says that about 80 per cent of the cane sugar of the world is now annually produced on tropical and semitropical islands. The prospective output for 1903-04 of the leading single producers, Cuba and Java, constitutes 45 per cent of the world's cane sugar.
