Wheat is quoted at 62 to 63 cents, with no movement to speak of. The holiday market presents a rather uninteresting face, as there is no strong demand for any of the specialties, and the weather today is against country trade. Eggs are yet 30 cents, and there are enough on the market to meet the local demand. Country butter is coming in more briskly today than for several weeks, and is in demand. Cranberries are being shipped in large quantities, and the use of this winter luxury seems to be increasing every year. Turkeys are not plentiful, although dealers do not yet anticipate a scarcity for Thanksgiving.
