

STUDYING OREGON

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY IN PORTION OF STATE.

Bulletins on Artesian Water and Petroleum Supply of Southeastern Counties—Bulletins Ready for Distribution.

During the summer of 1902 Professor Israel C. Russell, with two assistants, who were students of the University of Michigan, made a rapid reconnaissance through portions of Southwestern Idaho and Southeastern Oregon. His purpose was to ascertain in what localities, if any, the geological conditions are favorable for obtaining flowing water by drilling wells. A preliminary report on the artesian basins discovered was published by the United States geological survey in water supply and irrigation paper No. 78.

A bulletin has since been prepared on the general geology of the region traversed. It will be of particular interest to the people of Idaho and Oregon. In certain instances it also serves to supplement the report on artesian conditions. This bulletin, which is No. 217, is entitled, "Notes on the geology of Southwestern Idaho and Southeastern Oregon," is now ready for distribution and may be obtained by application to the director of the United States geological survey, Washington, D. C.

The route followed by Professor Russell's party was so planned as to traverse as many as possible of the valleys of Southwestern Idaho and Southeastern Oregon, where rich agricultural land is plentiful and where artesian conditions are most likely to be present.

Portions of Canyon and Owyhee counties, Idaho, and of Malheur and army counties, Oregon, were examined, but nothing like an exhaustive geological survey of the region was attempted. The discovery of water supplies was the main end of the reconnaissance, and the study of geological conditions was merely an incident.

Pressed as he was for time, however, Professor Russell was nevertheless able to make some extremely interesting observations regarding the geology of the district visited. The most interesting feature of the report refers to his study of the volcanic phenomena. A chapter on petroleum, which closes the bulletin, is of special economic value.

Search for petroleum has been carried on in the valley of Snake river in Southwestern Idaho and adjacent portions of Oregon, but these attempts have proved failure; so far as the discovery of the material sought is concerned.

Dickering Over Terms.

After being on the point of striking, Manager McCullough, of the Chicago South Side street car lines, finally consented to a meeting with a committee from the men, and at this writing the prospects are that if any concessions at all are made there will be no strike. Otherwise the men will be compelled to go out. The shopmen and firemen have been given a raise in wages in order to prevent the shutting down of the power houses in case of a strike.

Union Responsible.

An Indianapolis Court has decided responsible for any loss which an employer suffered through a boycott, the case is being taken to the higher courts by the national organization of carpenters. The decision that lack of incorporation does not prevent the unions for being responsible for the result of their boycotts is a very important one to all labor organizations, as a dozen or more

Injuries From Carbolic Acid. Warnings are given in a medical journal against the injury to skin and even bone which may result from the long continued use of weak—say, 3, 2% or even 2 per cent—carbolic applications, especially upon peripheral portions of the body, such as the fingers. This effect, it is asserted, is due in a small measure to the action of carbolic acid upon the vasomotor system, but in the main to its destructive effect upon the red and white blood corpuscles. This induces, partly in a mechanical and partly in a chemical way, stasis, first in the capillaries and, if the action of the drug be continued, then in the larger veins and arteries, with the result that the nutrition of the part is interfered with and the removal of the harmful substances hindered; the maceration of the epidermis caused by the acid favors evaporation, so that the gangrene is a dry one, a mummification, as it were.
