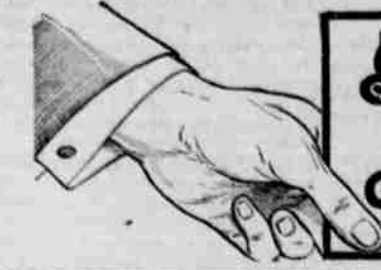

The Russian olive attains a height of from twenty to thirty feet, has dark green bark, very heavy wood and burns like a candle. Some Europeans call it the "candle tree." The foliage has a rich, silver, silver color of willow shape with deep golden and very fragrant flowers. It is a very handsome ornamental tree.
