No new features have appeared in the markets today, and those who expect to celebrate Thanksgiving with a dinner, will have to be content with the elaborate lists of luxuries that have appeared in this column during the past week. The supply of turkeys has been adequate to the demands, and the prices have been within reach of all, so there is no reason why every table in the city tomorrow should not have its fat gobbler. Wheat and fat cattle are unchanged. If there is any change in hay, it is a slight upward tendency, although not yet quoted by the dealers. Feed and other grains are unchanged, with little movement. Eggs are 35 and 40 cents today but a slump in the price is looked for, following Thanksgiving.

RAIN IS GENERAL

BAD ROADS HAVE STOPPED ALL HAULING.

Range Freshened by Wet Month, But Freighters Put Out of Business—Ore to Come Out of Susanville District Yet—Too Much Rain for Crops, in Places.

The rains that have visited Pendleton during the past two weeks, have been general all over the Eastern Oregon counties, and especially south of Pendleton.

One of the most noticeable results of the wet spell, is the absence of the freight teams from the interior towns. Before the rain came the streets of Pendleton were often well filled with four and six horse teams from Dale, Ukiah, Susanville and other interior points, loaded with winter supplies.

During the month ending November 7, it is estimated by Pendleton dealers that 500 tons of flour, feed, vegetables, winter supplies and merchandise went south over the wagon road leading from this city toward Grant county. The roads were in excellent condition, for the entire month of October, and the teamsters took advantage of the situation, to rush the fall hauling.

Since it began raining, on the first day of the irrigation meeting, in this city, on Nov. 9, there have not been a dozen teams over these roads, and while the rain made good pasture, and held off feeding weather for a few weeks, it stopped all heavy hauling from and to the interior points.

There is a large shipment of ore to come out of the Susanville district, yet this winter, it is reported by those interested in the mining industry there, but if the roads continue in the present condition, this shipment will be laid over until spring.

A heavy fall of snow visited the Alba and Dale district, early in the month, but the continued rain has melted most of it off the foothills, and stock are still to be found making a good living on the fresh grass, although in the settled districts, feeding is now being done.

In the wheat belt the rain has been welcome, although more has fallen than was actually needed by the growing crops, and in many places too much has fallen for the good of the crops.
