PENDLETON RETAIL MARKETS

Quotations on Staples Furnished by Local Merchants and Revised Daily.

Although hay is very scarce in al-
 most every portion of the county and
 Eastern Oregon, there has not been
 any appreciable raise in the price in
 Pendleton. Bran and mill feed are
 selling at the same price quoted a
 month ago, and the scarcity is not
 being felt in any districts in Umatilla
 county. Eggs are quoted at 30 and
 35 cents today, following the Thanks-
 giving rush. More country eggs are
 coming to town and the grocers pre-
 dict a gradual reduction in the price,
 until just a short time before Christ-
 mas, when the increased demand will
 likely cause a raise of a few cents.
 The markets are uneventful.

IOWA EDUCATORS.
 Representatives of College and Sec-
 ondary School Men.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 26.—Many
 men of prominence in college and
 school work of Iowa were present to-
 day at the state conference of col-
 lege and secondary school men. The
 conference was opened at Drake uni-
 versity at 10 o'clock this morning
 with an invocation by the Rev. Wal-
 ter M. Walker. President George A.
 MacLean, of the University of Iowa,
 read the call for the gathering and
 explained the purposes of the confer-
 ence.

The attitude of the high school to-
 wards the college and the university
 was one of the chief subjects dis-
 cussed during the day, the partici-
 pants representing all branches of ed-
 ucational work. College entrance re-
 quirements and the function of the
 high school in preparing teachers for
 elementary schools were among other
 matters that received attention.
 State Superintendent Barrett, Pro-
 fessor J. H. T. Main of Iowa college
 and a number of other prominent ed-
 ucators took part in the discussions.

SOUTH DAKOTA BUILDING.
 Will Have a Fine Exhibit at the
 World's Fair.

St. Louis, Nov. 28.—A site for the
 South Dakota building at the World's
 fair has been definitely selected. The
 building will occupy a conspicuous
 location opposite the Texas building
 and east of Oregon's. South Dakota
 will erect a handsome structure, cov-
 ering, with porches, 74 by 86 feet.
 The exterior will be covered with the
 famous South Dakota cement.

The state also plans to make very
 fine agricultural and horticultural dis-
 plays, and, besides the mineral ex-
 hibits of gold, tin, cement, etc., will
 have in the Mines and Metallurgy
 building a relief map of the famous
 Black Hills region, and an outside ex-
 hibit of reduction works, with amal-
 gam and cyanide plants, that will be
 run continuously on Black Hills ore
 throughout the exposition period.
