GENERAL NEWS.

William J. Bryan lunched Monday with the lord mayor of Belfast, Ireland.

In the Collis P. Huntington collection of paintings is an original Joshua Reynolds, which cost \$55,000.

The shipbuilding firm of Townsend & Downey, of New York, has gone into the hands of a receiver. It was capitalized at \$3,500,000.

Sudden and intense cold caught the Neva river when the great flood was at its highest, greatly complicating a situation already very serious.

The Jewell Lutheran college, near Marshalltown, Ia., burned Monday. Loss, \$25,000 to the building, and it is believed a student was cremated.

The net value of the late Collis P. Huntington's estate was \$26,505,540. The debts, funeral expenses, executors' commissions and administrative commissions amounted to \$9,000,000.

The members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen of the Pennsylvania lines, are formulating demands to be paid the same wages for their present nine-hour day formerly received for a 10-hour day.

James Berganous, a Chicago restaurant keeper, deliberately shot Marcus Sheehan, an elevated road guard, through the head, killing him, because he was a nickel short in paying for his breakfast Monday last.

Evelyn and Minnie Thompson, aged 16 and 19, were yesterday run down and killed by an express train at Coal Bluffs, Pa. They had just stepped on a curve, off one track onto another, as two swift trains passed each other at that spot.

A. S. Hill worked for railroads 30 years as trackman, trainman and general utility man about shops, without meeting with even a slight accident. Sunday last he was caught between bumpers at Denver and instantly killed by his chest being crushed in.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The union plumbers, who have been on a strike in Spokane, for the past three weeks, returned to work at the old wages, Monday.

Mrs. M. A. Hunziker, a pioneer of Oregon, died at Eugene Monday, aged 71. She walked across the plains to Oregon, in 1852, from Iowa.

Samuel Baumann, who killed Adolph Burkhardt, in Portland, on Halloween night, says he only shot to scare his victim, not intending to hit him.

C. B. Floyd, head weaver at the Oregon City Woolen Mills, fell dead with heart disease at a public reception at the home of Father Hildebrand, in that city, Monday.

John Howard shot and fatally wounded Elmer Dorey, at Westfall, Malheur county, Sunday night, mistaking him for Al Long, a neighbor, whom he intended to kill.

It is reported that the appearance of a quantity of fresh water in Salt Lake is one of the most recent developments of that strange body of water. The Harriman officials are studying the phenomena with the aid of scientists.

Fred Snider, and a son of Pitt River Johnnie, two Indian boys, were burned to death in the city jail at Bonanza, a small town near Klamath Falls, Sunday night. They were placed in the jail for drunkenness, and set fire to it on the inside.

The steamer Oregon has been chartered by the O. R. & N. to ply between Portland and San Francisco, while the Columbia is undergoing repairs. From 1879 to 1894, the Oregon was the leading coast vessel, but has been off the run since the Alaskan rush.

CRISIS IN MONTANA

LEGISLATURE HAS MET
IN SPECIAL SESSION

Legislation Necessary to Determine the Status of Some Great Corporations, Their Laborers, the Courts and Business Interests of That State and Parts of Three Other States.

Helena, Mont., Dec. 1.—The extraordinary session of the Montana legislature which convened today in pursuance of the call issued three weeks ago by Governor Toole is likely to be the arena for a gladiatorial combat as fierce and as intensely interesting as the session of several years ago which witnessed the titanic struggle between Copper King William A. Clarke and Marcus Daly for a seat in the United States senate.

In the present instance the results are far more momentous than in the case of the struggle for the senatorship. The future welfare and prosperity of one entire and portions of three other states may be said to depend upon the action of the session. Arrayed against one another in the gigantic fight is F. Augustus Heinze, of the Montana Ore Purchasing company, backed by the independent copper men of three states, and the Standard Oil company, as represented by the Amalgamated Copper company.

For Compulsory Change of Venue.

The aim of the session is to pass a law whereby mining cases may be taken from one court to another when the judge in the initial court is shown to be prejudiced. Other legislation of like character has also been promised. A so-called Fair Trial bill, of the character now proposed, was passed by the last legislature, but was decided by the supreme court to be unconstitutional on technical grounds.

The present situation is due to a coup executed by F. Augustus Heinze, president of the United States Copper company and the arch enemy of the Amalgamated interests. One of his lieutenants, a young man named John MacGinnis, was the owner of a few shares of the Boston and Montana Copper company.

He secured a decision from District Judge Clancy restraining the Boston and Montana company from paying dividends to the Amalgamated on the ground that it is contrary to the laws of Montana for one corporation to own stock in another corporation. Furthermore, on application, he secured a decision from Judge Clancy in which the latter said he might at any time appoint a receiver for the Boston and Montana. By these decisions the Amalgamated was badly hampered, and the "fair trial" bill being nullified by the supreme court, it could not secure the transfer of the matter to another court.

Big Struggle Ahead.

After vainly bringing pressure to bear upon the governor to call a special session of the legislature, the Amalgamated shut down its mines, throwing 30,000 men out of work. General Manager Scallan announcing that under the laws of Montana the company could not secure justice, and that it would be useless to operate the mines until assurance of fair treatment was given. He also said that the mines should be reopened whenever the governor should issue a call for a special session of the legislature to pass remedial legislation.

True to his promise, General Manager Scallan ordered every mine and smelter reopened on the day Governor Toole issued his call for the special session.

Now, in slang phrase, "it is up to" the legislature to frame, in response to popular demand, a change of venue or change of judge bill by which a litigant may evade going before a prejudiced judge, and a bill changing the practice so that the supreme court may review findings of fact rendered by a trial judge, as well as conclusions of law.

Such legislation will not be enacted without a bitter struggle. It is to be a battle to the death between the Amalgamated on one side and the Heinze forces and adherents of the United Copper company on the other. To one side or the other it will be a Waterloo.
