NOT E. S. M'COMAS.

Telegram Prints Photograph of Hand some Man and Calls it McComas.

The Portland Telegram of Wednesday printed a photograph in its mining department and gave it the name of E. S. McComas, the veteran newspaper man and mining broker of Union.

The photograph was not of McComas, as he looks now, nor as he ever looked. E. S. McComas wears a flowing pair of "sideburns" that give him a Darwinian charm, has a full, round face, and, although there is room on the top of his head for a full supply of auburn locks, when last seen at his busy office in Union there were but sixteen hairs left that would reach across the top of his head, from one ear to the other, in a proud attempt to protect a scalp that has run several guantlets in Oregon Indian wars.

The photograph accompanied a "write-up" of Mr. McComas' molybdenum mine, 65 miles from Union, but the picture was not of "Mac."

E. S. Comas wears several distinctions worth mentioning. He was the first writing school teacher in Union county, and when he went into the "Iowa" settlement there, in 1864, so many of the settlers signed their names by making an "X" that McComas named it the "saw buck" settlement, after the sign of the X or saw buck used in every signature.

In 1864 McComas walked alone from Idaho City to Umatilla Landing, a distance of 320 miles, through a hostile Indian country. At that time it was regarded as an impossible feat. He afterward started the first newspaper in Union county, the Mountain Sentinel, and was the man who introduced "Medical Lake Salts" to the world.

He cut the first cord wood ever made in Umatilla county, so far as recorded. He hired the Walla Walla Indians to cut a balm grove on the Columbia, a few miles above Umatilla Landing, into four-foot wood. He paid the Indians \$1 per cord for cutting their own timber and he sold it to the first settlers at the Landing at \$7 per cord.

He is now searching for a fabulously rich quartz mine, hidden away in the Wallawa mountains. Charley Shaplish, or "Whirlwind," the Umatilla Indian, claims to know where the
