### GENERAL NEWS.

There are 28 mills in the American paper trust.

Jews of all nationalities must be armed with passports of especial nature before they can cross the Russian frontier under any pretext whatever.

Mrs. Nettie Klingenberg, of Des Moines, shot and killed her divorced husband. He was insane, escaped from the state asylum and assailed her viciously.

Kansas City will exhibit at St. Louis vitascope pictures taken on her business streets, boulevards and in the parks. It will be entirely novel as a municipal exhibit.

Sheriff Cook, of Woodmore, L. I., got 90 days in jail for kissing Mary Sullivan, a school teacher, against her will. He says he was willing to "do" 10 days, but that it was not worth three months.

December 16 will meet in New York a convention of scientists and citizens of New York, New Jersey, Delaware and several other states, to consider ways and means of mitigating or ridding the mosquito pest. The governor of New Jersey will preside.

The sudden and phenomenal advance in the price of American cotton and the shortage in the East Indian crop has created excitement bordering on panic in the cotton mill districts of England, as it means scarcity of work and great privation during the coming winter.

Fire December 4 destroyed the H. D. Lee Mercantile Company's building and part of the stock at Salina, Kan. Loss, \$450,000. It was a wholesale grocery establishment and will be at once rebuilt and restocked. One hundred and thirty people were thrown out of employment.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Central Willamette Medical Association was organized Friday at Albany. It is composed of the physicians of Linn, Benton and Lincoln counties.

Rev. R. M. Kennedy, who has been in jail at Hillsboro, for the past two months on a charge of burglary, is now on trial, and entered a plea of "not guilty," on Friday.

The city council of La Grande has accepted the lot of ground presented by the Women's Park committee, for a city park, and will plant it to trees and shrubbery and otherwise beautify it.

Peter Russel, foreman of an O. S. L. bridge crew, was killed by a passenger train near Ontario, Friday, while attempting to remove his handcar from the track. Two companions escaped by jumping from the car.

As a result of the failure of the Western Grain and Provision Exchange, of Butte, its customers will lose between \$30,000 and \$40,000. It operated the largest line of bucket shops of any company in the state of Montana, and was doing a heavy business.

"Viola Drummond," a thoroughbred cow, just purchased by Honeyman Brothers, of Portland, has a record of 10,000 pounds of milk in 365 days, and a record of 58 pounds for one day, all testing 3.5 per cent butter fat. She is from Woodville, N. Y., and holds six state premiums.

Colonel John P. Irish, who has held the office of naval inspector at San Francisco for the past four years, is about to be ousted. Irish is a democrat and was given the office in return for taking the stump in opposition to Bryan in his campaign of 1896. Two republican applicants are now after the job.
