Woman Undertaker Performs a Sad
Task at Spokane.

With her own hands, pretty Mrs.
Etta Patton buried a little child yester-
day, says the Spokesman-Review.
No mourners, no pall bearers, accom-
panied the hearse on its journey to
the cemetery. The grave had been
dug, and when Fairmount cemetery
was reached, the woman, unaided,
lowered the little coffin into the grave
and then filled up the opening. Mrs.
Patton is the manager of the Wash-
ington Undertaking company, and the
child was Alphonse Schuster, the 8-
year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph
Schuster.

The child died of diphtheria, and,
according to the law, no one but the
undertaker was to have any connec-
tion with its interment, but this fact
nor that the weather was bleak and
cold on the cemetery hills had the
least effect as a deterrent on the
brave little woman undertaker.

POTTERY WORKS BURN.

Valuable Plant at Spokane Totally
Destroyed—Loss, \$15,000.

Spokane, Dec. 5.—The Jackman-
Oudin pottery works were totally de-
stroyed by fire at an early hour this
morning. The flames lighted up the
sky and could be plainly seen from all
parts of the city. Despite the hard
and desperate work of the depart-
ment, practically everything was de-
stroyed.

The loss is \$15,000, partly covered
by insurance. The company has been
having trouble in the courts for some
time, but all seemed settled, when an-
other disaster in the shape of the
fire demon destroyed the works.
