Sixty-Six Thousand Sacks in Hands of One Company.
The Pacific Coast Elevator Compa

ny now has on hand in their houses in the county 55,365 sacks of wheat and 10,583 sacks of barley. This is grain that has been put in by those who did not wish to sell for the prices quoted, and that which has been bought by the company and is now being held for better saies. This is but a small part of

grain that has been handled during the season, it being estimated at about one-fifth of the total amount. The rest was shipped to the coast for export, though some was bought for the city mills and sold to them. There is now but little movement in the grain market and will not be in all probability until later in the year, when the status of the next year's crop will fix the price for the rem-nants of the grain on hand.
