GENERAL NEWS.

William J. Bryan has reached Paris on his European tour.

Thad A. Neeley, inventor of the adjustable roller skate, died December 4 at Muncie, Ind.

During the month of November there were 470 births and 669 deaths in the city of San Francisco. Fifty-three deaths were by violent means.

The Russian government denies that the form of passports required of Jews has been changed, or that it is different from that required of other people.

The 3-year-old son of F. G. Gould, of Oakland, Cal., in one day's time strayed from home a distance of four miles. No one can be found who gave him food or water, or saw him rest.

George Wood, a Colfax, Ia., banker, shot and killed himself. He was owner of three banks, was worth \$250,000 and left all accounts straight and no motive is known, though domestic troubles are suspected.

Not all the money, influence and "spurge" of horse lovers in Eastern society has been able to popularize in America the high-stepping Hackney coach horse, notwithstanding his beauty, spirit and style. Nothing but a flatfooted gait takes in this country.

The San Francisco Call is authority for the statement that "only" 19 men were killed this fall in the United States while playing football. A great many more than that number were killed on the railroads, in mines and died of delirium tremens during the same period, so of course there is no excuse for the continual yowling about the dangers of football.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Eight students and two instructors at Stanford University, are now suffering with diphtheria.

M. W. Jones, of Hoquiam, Wash., fractured his skull and is fatally injured by a fall from a second story mill floor, Saturday night.

The Oregon Short Line is now negotiating for the purchase of the Boise, Nampa and Owyhee railroad, extending from Nampa to Emmett.

John Slaughter, for 36 years territorial and state librarian of Wyoming, and the oldest pioneer in that state, died Sunday at Cheyenne, aged 97.

The county court of Clatsop county is now considering the advisability of establishing a county high school in conjunction with the Astoria city high school.

John Shay, committed suicide by hanging at Ashland, Sunday morning. Shay was one of the principal witnesses to the murder of Inhoff by C. H. McKenzie, at Danismuir, Cal., last Monday.

All but five of the 69 bodies lost in the Hanna, Wyo., coal mine horror last August, have been recovered, and it is thought these were entirely consumed in the fire that raged in the mines for weeks.

George Johnson, of Roseburg, Or., a student in the department of mines, at the University of California, was found unconscious in his room, Sunday morning, having been overcome by gas. Little hope for his recovery is entertained.

John Reynolds, of Seattle, has been sentenced to hang at Walla Walla penitentiary, for the murder of William McNally, in Seattle, last July. This will be the first execution under the new law requiring hangings to take place within the walls of the penitentiary.

WORRIED TO DEATH

SUICIDE LEAVES PARTING
REBUKE TO A LAWYER

C. E. Cochran of Union Said to Have
Worried William McKinnell of Pine
Valley, Baker County, to Death—
Charges of the Dead Man.

Baker City, Dec. 7.—With almost his last breath William McKinnell, of Carson, who committed suicide last night in the Bnonough and Turley lodging house, said that he had been driven to his grave by the pestering of a tin horn lawyer, C. E. Cochran, of Union.

McKinnell's dead body was found in his bed at 8 o'clock last night, and beside the body was the following letter:

"Baker City, Ore., Dec. 3, 1903.
"To Whom It May Concern:

"The undersigned being a man of honest parentage and honorable intentions, but being pestered to the verge of despair by a tin horn attorney—C. E. Cochran of Union, who has no antecedents only those acquired at Medical Springs, takes this means of informing his fellow citizens—that he is tired of life's history and glad to death's mystery swift to be buried—anywhere—anywhere out of this world.

"W. M. KINNELL.
"Good Bye to the West I loved so well."

Immediately upon the finding of the body Coroner Snow was summoned and a jury empaneled to inquire into the cause of death.

After hearing all the testimony at the inquest the coroner's jury found that McKinnell had come to his death by an overdose of laudanum, administered by his own hand.

Cochran had worried him over the settlement of an estate which he was appointed to administer, until it is alleged by residents near Carson McKinnell had threatened self-destruction on several occasions.

Cochran is a well known lawyer of Union and the reference to his connection with Medical Springs is said to relate to the separation of a man and wife formerly living at Medical Springs, by Cochran, and his subsequent great interest in the affairs of the widow. McKinnell is said to have referred to this as an instance of Cochran's meddlesome disposition and unsavory career.

UNIONIZING FARMERS.

New Organization Enrolling Vast Numbers in Texas.

Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 7.—The farmers of Texas are being unionized at a rapid rate.

There are today 3,000 unions in Texas, with a total membership of 40,000 or more, and the organization is spreading like wildfire. It began at Emory, Raines county, about ten months ago, under the name of the Farmers' Educational and Co-Operative union of America, and is now established in nearly every populous county in Texas.

About the middle of February next a meeting will be held for completing a state organization and it is believed the movement will spread to other states, as the Farmers' Alliance, which organized in Kansas, did a few years ago.

The purpose of the union is to buy and sell in bulk, to educate along agricultural lines and to eschew politics, but nevertheless to discuss political economy.

CRISIS IN JAPAN.

Principal issue is the Manchurian Question.

Tokio, Dec. 5.—The session of the Japanese parliament which begun today is expected on all sides to be the most momentous since the nation adopted the parliamentary form of government, not even excepting the session which preceded the outbreak of the war with China.

The unsettled and unsatisfactory situation with regard to the government's negotiations with Russia is certain to lead a violent attack on the ministry by the opposition. The opposition, which is rapidly gathering strength, will demand war with Russia and may, it is feared, inflame public sentiment to the war point.

Walla Walla, Dec. 5.—The domestic troubles of Valeska Lueders and Alfred W. Lueders have been settled. In the superior court, this morning, Mrs. Lueders, through her attorney, John H. Pedigo, filed a motion for a dismissal of the action. She gave as a reason for the dismissal that through the intervention of friends of the parties the matter had been amicably settled. Judge Brents granted the motion and the action was dismissed.

Walla Walla, Dec. 5.—The first steps toward beautifying the race track property of the Walla Walla County Fair association will be the planting of 150 locust trees, the work being commenced this morning under the supervision of Director James Kidwell.
