Mr. Brown commenced the search

early last Sunday and has devoted his entire time since in searching for the bodies, but has been unable to locate the remains. The character of the river at the

place where the drowning occurred is such that the bodies may not be re-covered until they come to the surcovered until they come to the sur-face and drift to the eddies below.

For five miles the waters are very wild and a continual series of eddies and whirls and it is probable that the remains will be carried beneath the surface for a long distance unless caught by the rocks in the bottom of the river in which event it would be months before they come to the sur
