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## FOUND DEAD IN BED

OLD GENTLEMAN DIES

SUDDENLY AT HURON.

Coroner Decides That No Inquest Is Necessary—His Companions Supposed the Deceased Was Asleep, When They Came Home From Work in the Evening.

Edward Hachsen was found dead in bed last night at 6 o'clock by his son-in-law, John Graves, when he returned to his home at Huron, after having been at work during the day.

The deceased was an old man, 69 years of age and a native of Great Britain, and has lived in Umatilla county for the past six years. He and his son-in-law have been at Huron for some time, where the latter is one of the best-known woodmen in that part of the county.

The deceased had been feeling badly for some time, and yesterday had not gone to the woods, but remained at home, going to bed after the rest of the men had gone to their work. When they came home in the evening they saw the old man on the bed, but thought that he was asleep, and so went about getting the supper. When the meal had been prepared they called Mr. Hachsen, and as he did not respond, one of them went to the bed to awaken him, when it was found that he was dead.

The coroner was called and went to the place this morning, and after an investigation found that the deceased had come to his death from natural causes. The funeral has not yet been decided upon.
