FOR ONE PURPOSE

GOV. CHAMBERLAIN WILL RESTRICT WORK IF HE CAN.

Hopes That the Tax Law Alone Will Be Considered—Other Matters Will Be Interjected, But Will Be Protested—Umatilla County Delegation Favors Short Session Without Any Side Issues.

Governor Chamberlain is determined to confine the special session to the consideration of the tax law, and, while other matters have been agitated and threats have been made to prolong discussion on the corporation tax law, the portage road, the law to revise the statute under which county recorders are maintained in a separate office, in some of the counties, and many other important matters, the governor yet has faith in the members of the legislature and expects to complete the work of correcting the tax law within a few days.

His wishes have been so clearly set forth many times since the necessity for the special session became apparent, and while he sent out letters to the members, exacting a promise to consider nothing but the tax law, he did not obtain direct promises from but a small majority of the members.

Special Session Justified.

The pressure brought to bear upon him from the different school districts of the state, and from some of the counties, which were in bad financial condition justified the special session, although the members, after convening, saw fit to prolong the discussions into weeks, making it extremely costly for the people, and providing an opportunity to politicians to "trade" and jockey on local measures.

It is believed in Eastern Oregon that the Multnomah county delegation will be squarely against the portage road when the session convenes, and one of the first matters to be considered will be the partial repeal of the portage road bill, and the transfer of the appropriation to the purchase of the right of way for the ship canal.

Umatilla county members of the legislature are in favor of the shortest session possible, the adjournment of the new tax law and adjournment without a word of discussion on any side issue which will prolong the session, to increase the burden on the taxpayers.

As has been repeatedly said by the members from this county, they are all unqualifiedly opposed to the repeal or modification of the portage road law, unless it can be proven beyond doubt that it has served its purpose and that quicker relief could be afforded by the construction of the ship canal.

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Governor Reiterates His Views.

In speaking of the special session to the Oregon Daily Journal, yesterday, Governor Chamberlain said: "My message will deal wholly with the revision of the tax law, which is the cause of the special session. I am opposed to bringing any other matters before the legislature, as I do not deem them of sufficient urgency to require attention at this time. I have received letters from members of the legislature from different sections of the state, requesting that I sanction the consideration of various other bills.

"I do not believe that it is business policy and justice to the taxpayers at this time to allow an extended session of the legislature. I still, as heretofore, oppose the consideration of any measure presented aside from the tax law.

"I have not the power, of course, to obstruct or prevent the introduction and passage of bills which may be advocated if a majority of the members favor them. My recommendations in the message will be against the taking up of any business outside of the tax issue, which is paramount and upon which depends the progress and welfare of the entire state.

"The decision of Attorney General Crawford, on the Cello right of way, was as I anticipated, and was of great importance to the improvement of the waterways, as now it is possible to go ahead and take intelligent action."

NO WOOD FAMINE.

Walla Walla Fuel Question is Not Alarming.

Walla Walla, Dec. 12.—Wood and coal dealers report a lively business the last ten days since the opening of the chilly snap which has necessitated unusual demands on the coal bins and wood sheds of the city. There is no scarcity of fuel in Walla Walla this winter and no famine, such as was threatened earlier in the year in Pendleton, is in prospect.

Quotations remain practically unchanged from three weeks ago. Four foot soft wood selling at \$6 a cord and 16-inch wood at \$6.50 with the best woods, such as alder, poplar and oak, at \$7.50 and \$8, according to length. The Diamond, Kemmerer and Rock Springs varieties of coal, all from Wyoming, are \$8.50. Roslyn coal is \$7 per ton.

Fine Bull Sold.

W. O. Minor this week sold to Mill Moran, of Spray, Lovely's Chief, a fine Shorthorn bull, says the Hepper Gazette. This animal was sired by Strathlain Chief, for which Mr. Minor paid \$1,000, and the dam was Lovely of the Valley, a cow that cost \$1,100.
