



JAPANESE BUILDING.

Work Begun Thereon at World's Fair Grounds in St. Louis.

Louis, Dec. 16 .--- Under the di-St rection of S. Murai, a Japanese gov-erament architect, a force of carpen-ters from the land of the Mikado tocommenced actual work in the construction of the Japanese national pavilion at the world's fair. Seven large buildings, as well as a number pagodas, are to be erected on the Japanese reservation south of the Machinery building.

These buildings include the com missioner's office, the Bellevue pavil-ion, a bazaar pavilion, a Kinkaku tea pavilion, a Formosa tea pavilion, a tea articles show building, an ornate er trance and the main pavilion. The main pavilion is to be a reproduction of the "Shishinden," the palace at Tokio in which the Mikado grants au A large part of the material to be

used in the Japanese buildings, in cluding tiles, elaborate carvings, etc in have been brought from Japan. The billdings are to be constructed en tirely by Jananese workmen.

One Hundred and Thirtleth Anniver

sary of a Famous Little Event.

Boston, Dec. 16-Today is the an niversary of the Boston Tea Party which took place December 16, 1773 when tea, on which the coloniais were expected to pay the hated stamp tax, was dumped into the harbor by promteent Bostonians disguised as Indians.
