THE

GRANT AND BAKER COUNTIES ARE HOPEFUL

Line Will Traverse Richest Section of Oregon-Right of Way Has Been Secured Most of the Way-Said to Have Good Financial Backing.

The people of Grant county, and, fact, those of Baker and Harney. in fact, are watching the development of the Bonta railroad with deep Interest, and by many of the most conserva-tive men from those districts it is believed that the road will ultimately be built.

It is definitely announced that large tie contract has been let to a Prairie City man, that much of the right of way through Grant county has been secured and that clearing the right of way in many places will actually begin in the spring.

The Bonta road has been talked of for so long that the people on the outside have lost faith in it, but substantial business men from the John Day and Prairie City country have expressed the opinion that at least a short line will be built, probably with no further intention than that of heading off the Sumpter valley peo-ple in securing valuable right of way and timber resources,

The proposed line will run through Prairie City and Quartzburg, and on through the rich agricultural and through the rich agricultural and stock raising districts of Grant and Harney counties, to Burns. While the right of way has not all been located yet, those who are in touch with it say that it will tap every rich valley throughout that country and will extend on through the Slivies River experiment, trigaring project. River government trigation project.

If the John Day coal fields prove to be valuable a branch line will be built down the John Day river, to tap that great belt, and head off any line which may be projected from the direction of Heppner,

It is said the Bonta people have se ared sufficient backing from a Philadelonia firm to justify the assertion that the road is on good financial backing, and there is no fear of its fallure on that score, if once under taken.
