### GENERAL NEWS.

Forty tons of raw silk valued at \$200,000, is on the Indrapura from China to Portland, for American consumption exclusively.

The "several million dollars" which was Y. Gill, the deposed president of San Domingo took with him to Europe, has dwindled to \$200,000.

Butler, Pa., has 18,900 inhabitants, of whom just one-tenth either have typhoid fever now or have had the disease within the past six weeks.

Germany, Mexico and Japan are installing their exhibits at St. Louis—the first foreign countries that have reached that stage with their exhibits.

Travelers over the Trans-Siberian railway report a steady movement of Russian troops and munitions of war eastward into Manchuria, despite all denials on the part of Russian officials.

As a result of French interdiction of religious orders, and secularization of their property, 6,000 monks and nuns have gone to England, 1,800 to the United States and 1,100 to Canada.

A clerk in the office of an importing chemist in Chicago, has received \$9 per week for four months, and during that time stole valuable goods of his employer to the average value of \$200 per day.

It is believed that Panama will assume one-third of the entire debt of Colombia, which is \$10,000,000. This is President Roosevelt's advice, and is backed up by the most influential members of the new government.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Washington stockmen are taking steps toward the formation of a state organization.

The North Yakima Light and Power plant has been sold to Eastern capitalists for \$500,000.

Mrs. W. M. Bilyeu, one of the oldest pioneers of Linn county, died Friday at Seilo, aged 82.

Mrs. P. M. Gray, of Salem, died Friday, aged 78. She crossed the plains from Iowa to Oregon in 1853.

W. W. Campbell was drowned at Hoquiam, Wash., Friday. He walked off a scow into the river, in the darkness.

The early run of steel head salmon on the Lower Columbia is very heavy and the price paid the fishermen is four cents per pound.

The body of Byron Larson, of Republic, Wash., who was lost while hunting north of Spokane last week, was found on Loon mountain Friday.

W. W. Cotton, of Portland, has just been appointed a regent of the Oregon Agricultural College, to succeed Benton Killin, whose term has expired.

Fur dealers of Victoria, B. C., who sent 14,000 sealskins to the annual sales in London this month, received but \$15.53 each this year, compared to \$17.50 one year ago, a decline of about 15 per cent.

Matt Cramer, of Hoquiam, seized a live wire in his hand Friday and was knocked unconscious with the wire in his grasp. His wife grabbed an axe and severed the wire, saving his life. His hand was roasted to a crisp.

Two masked men riding in a buggy held up John Watchman, of Hubbard, Marion county, Thursday night, and robbed him of \$45 in his home. After making another unsuccessful attempt on a farmer near by, the robbers drove away. The entire county is up in arms and expect to capture the bandits.
