GENERAL NEWS.

William J. Bryan spent 14 hours at the home of Tolstoi, the Russian novelist.

There have been an average of three deaths per day for six weeks from typhoid fever at Butler, Pa.

Of the 6,957,000 tons of the American merchant marine, less than one-sixth does business at foreign ports.

This year's wheat crop in Australia is 76,000,000 bushels, against 48,000,000 bushels, the highest previous yield.

The volcano Mokuaweweoe, Hawaii, which had been incessantly active for several weeks, ceased all operations December 18, within an hour's time.

Attorney General Crow of Missouri, the indomitable prosecutor of municipal and legislative grafters, has nervous prostration and is wintering in California.

Mrs. Honoretta Marshall is dead at Worcester, Mass., aged 105 years. She was very wealthy and benevolent. For six years past she took to her exercise and transacted all her business after nightfall, and rested and slept during the daytime.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The La Grande city council voted a 10-mill tax for municipal purposes, Wednesday. Ten mills is the limit allowed by law.

James Gridu was sentenced to 30 days in jail at Oregon City, Wednesday, for stealing an overcoat from a Methodist preacher.

The body of A. Bergboom, a wood chopper, was found near St. Helens, on Wednesday, pinned beneath a fallen tree. He had been missing over a week.

Mattie Lea, known as "Dutch Mattie," a noted woman tough, shot and killed Charles Hillson, a wood hauler, at Phillipsburg, Montana, Wednesday over a \$1 debt.

P. Girard, who is wanted in Sonoma county, California, for the murder of Deputy Sheriff McKinnon, of Harney county, Oregon, was captured at Red Bluff, Wednesday.

Charley Anderson, a boy of 15, from Whatcom, is in jail at Seattle for robbery. He has the distinction of being the youngest highwayman on record in Seattle.

Garven Rae, a 15-year-old boy, captured a burglar at New Westminister, B. C., Wednesday by knocking him from his hands and grabbing him by the throat and clinging to him until assistance arrived.

The Weyerhaeuser Lumber company has secured a lease on Vancouver lake, Clark county, Washington, and will convert it into a vast storage reservoir for logs. The lake is about 160 acres in extent and will hold 60,000,000 feet of logs.
