THE PRIZE DRAWINGS CHRISTMAS TREES

FULL LIST OF WINNING NUMBERS GIVEN BELOW.

Interesting Results of the Enterprise of Three Leading Business Houses—A Grand Piano, Steel Range and Sleigh Were Among the Prizes—Holders of Numbers Not All Known Yet.

Christmas eve was the time of the drawings in three of the big stores of the city, and all during the evening large crowds were around the windows and inside of the stores waiting for the time of the drawings to commence. Each person had a little book or a bundle of tickets, and as the numbers were drawn each person of the entire throng was oblivious of the rest, as he looked eagerly through the list to see if he was the lucky one.

At the Alexander Store. At the Alexander Department Store the prize that the people longed for was a fine Hamilton piano. There were 58,000 tickets in the box, and out of these five were drawn. The lucky number is 57,351, and has not as yet been called for. Mr. Alexander will wait 35 days for this number to appear, and if by the end of the time no one has produced the number it will go to one of the following, in the order named: 5,218, 55,041, 21,819, held by Mrs. Cronin, and 28,431, held by the Queen Chop House.

At the Peoples Warehouse. The Peoples Warehouse has a long list of prizes to be distributed, and has provided a duplicate list so that there will be no chance for any of the presents not to be distributed. The number winning the buggy was 15,596, and it was held by Mrs. L. D. Smith. The number winning the steel range was 23,828, and has not yet been called for. The third lucky number, 357, was held by Mrs. Casper Van Dran, and won for her the sleigh. The fourth number, 18882, wins the baby carriage, and has not been called for. The fifth prize, a fine saddle, was won by Miss Leech, with number 4,700. The sixth prize, a life-sized doll, was won by M. R. Yates with number 19,742. The seventh prize was won by a Mr. Jones with number 21,289. This was the number that drew the goat and cart. No one has called for the second or the fourth numbers, and the duplicates on these are 21,833 and 17,433. If the first named numbers do not show up the second list will get the remaining prizes. There were about 49,000 numbers out.

At the St. Joe Store. The St. Joe Store gave away \$100 in cash the same evening, divided into \$50, \$25 and \$15 prizes. The three numbers winning in the order stated were 16,988, 26,700, and 22,509. The third number was held by W. D. McGee, but the other numbers have not as yet been reported. The management of the drawing drew at the time a list of duplicate numbers, and if the first named numbers have not been reported by the first of February these duplicates will be good for the prizes. The duplicate good for the first prize is 26,378 and for the second is 27,705. There were about 29,000 numbers held in the contest.
