GENERAL NEWS.

The Cuban government is trying to get a loan of \$35,000,000 in the United States, and tender the custom receipts as security.

The three largest lumber firms of Michigan have consolidated to be called the Hackley-Phelps-Bonnell Lumber Company.

Jem Mace, the pugilist and world's champion 10 to 45 years ago, is alive in England, well and active. He is over 70 years of age.

The Cathedral of Westminster (Catholic) is just completed, after being eight years in building, at a cost of \$1,000,000. It is entirely clear of debt.

L. H. Shetter, tobacco expert of the agricultural department, insists that tobacco as good as the best grown in Cuba can be produced to perfection in the United States.

From December 14 to 21 there were 259 deaths from pneumonia in New York City, from the 21st to 25th, 272. Many leading physicians are now claiming the disease is infectious.

Recent events in the Utah coal mining districts have incensed the labor unions greatly against the Mormons for their part in breaking the strike by furnishing unorganized labor to operate the mines.

A merger of the following railroads is being effected, the whole to form a system to be called the Chicago & Alton: Kansas City Southern, Chicago & Alton, Iowa Central, Clover Leaf and Minneapolis & St. Paul.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

There are now 150 cases of measles in Astoria.

Mrs. Mary E. Wirtz, a pioneer of Linn county, Oregon, died at Albany Tuesday, aged 87 years.

Portland is now asking residents to take roomers during the meeting of the National Livestock Association.

William Page, an American, was sentenced to 10 years and 60 lashes, at Vancouver, B. C., Tuesday, for robbery.

Tom Connolly, a Dalles sheepman, lost 900 head of sheep Monday night on his farm near that place, by smothering to death. The band piled up in a deep canyon and suffocated before they could be scattered.

The board of equalization in Linn county refused to reduce the assessment on timber land belonging to the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company from \$3 to \$2 per acre. The land is worth \$20 per acre and the board deemed the assessment low enough.

Work on the monster Hill steamers has been stopped, presumably for the reason that they are too large to enter the Oriental harbors safely. They were to ply out of Tacoma and great disappointment is felt among marine employees who expected to work on them.

The Pomona, a river boat plying on the Willamette between Oregon City and Corvallis, struck a sunken snag in the river near Salem, Tuesday and went to the bottom. The water was shallow at that point and the boat was only submerged to the lower deck. The passengers were picked up by a passing boat two hours later.

A daring attempt to break jail was made by the Bice brothers, confined for horse stealing, at Roseburg, Tuesday. They seized the deputy by the throat while he was handing in the noonday lunch, but before they had succeeded in getting out of the corridor, were confronted by the sheriff with a revolver. They were returned and placed in irons.

ONLY LIVING EX-PRESIDENT.

Cleveland Has Seen More Administrations Than Any Other.

Mr. Cleveland has lived in the time of more administrations than anyone who has ever been president. He was born in 1837. In that year Martin Van Buren was inaugurated president, consequently Mr. Cleveland has lived in the administrations of Van Buren, the short term of William Henry Harrison and the remainder of the term to which Tyler succeeded him; also in the administrations of Grant, Lincoln, Johnson, Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Arthur, Benjamin Harrison, McKinley, and thus far in the administration of Roosevelt—in all 18, and including his own in 20.

Mr. Cleveland has not only lived in the administrations mentioned, but he has lived to see six vice presidents succeed to the presidency, three of them—Johnson, Arthur and Roosevelt—coming to the White House through the assassination of their predecessors. The others were Van Buren, Tyler and Fillmore.

The fact that Mr. Cleveland is the only president who succeeded himself four years after his first administration is well known, and is to be added to the other unusual things about his political life.
