Says Western Stockmen Should Work for Transfer of Forest Reserve from Interior Department to the De partment of Agriculture-Should Help Repcal Lieu Land Law and Support Measure to Keep Tariff on Hides and Wool.

Some significant utterances con erning the condition of the national livestock industry and the duty of the stockmen of the state of Washington were made to a Union reporter in an interview yesterday with C. F. Martin, secretary of the National Livestock association, who was at Walla Walla assisting in the organization of the Washington Livestock association. The salient points brought out by Secretary Martin, who is a Colo-

rado stockman, were as follows:
The livestock industry of the states west of the Mississippi is helpless in the hands of the packers' combine.
An equally strong combine of tock-

men is needed to offset the packers' trust. The first act of organized stockmen should be to finance and establish an independent packing house

Stockmen should work for the ansier of forest reserves control transfer of forest reserves control from the hands of the department of ag the interior to the department of ag

They should work for the repeal of the flow land act.
They should support measures that

world tend to put open range in con-trol of individual stockmen, by lence. They should oppose removal of the tariff from hides and wool, sending delegations to fight the recent oil in-troduced by Senator Lodge of Massa

Mr. Martin said that these i-sues would be taken up at the national livestock convention, which meets in Portland January 12, and his interview practically constituted an out-line of the burning cattle and sheep problem of the day.

ALBERTA IRRIGATION SCHEME.

Vast Project of Reclamation Which the Canadian Pacific Has on Hand.

The great irrigation project, which the Canadian Pacific railway authorities have on hand in the Alberta dis-trict of the Canadian northwest, is the largest undertaking of its kind on this side of the globe, says the Ottawa correspondent of the Chicago Record-Herald. The scheme embraces an area of 8,000,000 acres lying east of Calgary. The soil throughout the area is good, but agriculture has not proved successful because during the dry years to which that portion of the territories is subject there is not sufficient moisture to manure crops or to supply surface water for slock.

Progress in Infigation. frigation is past the experimental stage in the territories. At the pres-ent time there are 163 irrigation ditches in southern Alberta and westu Assunibola, comprising a total

length of 475 mans. The immense area embraced by the Canadian Pacific company's scheme contains land suitable for all kinds of farming and large tracts specially adapted for cattle grazing. The com-pany's main irrigation canal will head in the Bow river, three miles below Calgary This canal will carry 2,000 cubic feet of water per second, and will be 60 feet wide at the bottom containing water to the depth of ten
