LICENSES TO WED

ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY.
FOUR ISSUED DURING 1903

Fees for issuance of Same Amounted to About \$500—Ages Run from 15 to 75 Years—Two Chinese and Eight Indians Among the Applicants.

The marriage license business in the clerk's office for the year 1903 has been a rushing one, and more tickets were issued in that time than have been sent out of the office at any year in the past. There have been 184 licenses issued in the year, and all but two of the certificates have been returned, so that it is safe to say that 360 people in the county have been made happy by the clerk during the year, if not permanently so, for a time at least. The county has been enriched about \$500 by the fees, the preachers and officers of the county who are permitted to perform the ceremonies have been put into possession of nearly twice that sum, and, sorry to say, the lawyers have also reaped a small harvest from one or two mismatched couples.

The ages of those applying for licenses have ranged from 15 to 75 years. There were two Chinese who took the American plan for the guidance of their future happiness, and eight Indians. One couple backed out after the issuance of the license and never married, and one preacher has forgotten to record the fact that he performed a marriage.

A romance is recorded in one instance, where a man married the widow left desolate by the death of his brother, and in another case two persons of the same name secured a license to wed.

GENERAL NEWS.

The First National Bank of Storm Lake, Iowa, has failed and a receiver has been appointed.

Miss Mary L. Leader, of Corbett, has been appointed teacher at the Klamath Indian school.

Exports from Germany to the United States were \$130,000,000 in 1903, as against \$115,000,000 in 1902.

Car and foundry employees of West Virginia have gone on a strike against a reduction of 10 per cent in wages.

Charles Ritter, of Bristol, Pike, Pa., is 70 years old; his wife is 60. Mrs. Ritter on December 30, gave birth to twin boys.

The Japanese army has a peace strength of 150,000 men and 30,000 horses, capable of expansion to 500,000 men and 100,000 horses.

Several victims of the Iroquois theater fire were "identified" who have since turned up alive and well in different parts of the country.

Young Corbett's share of the gate receipts and prize money from the recent bout in San Francisco was \$7,755. Hanlon's share was \$2,475.

New York City will hereafter remove ashes and other refuse from department buildings and other business houses, at an annual cost of \$1,500,000.

It has been found necessary to issue an order in New York City retiring from the police force every man affected with tuberculosis, which is alarmingly on the increase.

The "fire-proof" asbestos curtain in the Iroquois theater at Chicago, was entirely consumed by fire. It would, however, have been very effective in checking the fire could it have been pulled down.

A McMinnville saloon was robbed of \$15 in cash Sunday morning.

J. C. Conellin, a farmer, hanged himself to a tree at Lyle, Wash., Saturday night. No cause is assigned.

Claude J. Irvine, a miner, was horribly mangled at Everest Saturday night by an explosion of dynamite.

There has been one death from scarlet fever in Astoria and there are now three residences under quarantine.

John Holmes was arrested at La Grande Saturday for stealing a horse and buggy and is in jail under \$100 bonds.

Jesse Kays was instantly killed at Sand Lake, Tillamook county, Saturday, by getting caught in a belt in a shingle mill.

Nicholas Eicher, aged 7, died Sunday from the effects of ticks received from some older boys at school, several days ago.

The creameries of Union county produced 80,000 pounds of butter in 1903. Over \$19,000 was paid to farmers for butter fat, an increase of \$10,000 over 1902.

There are now 250,000 acres of school land for sale, mostly in Eastern Oregon counties. It sells at the highest bidder, but not for less than \$2.50 per acre.

Miss Elizabeth Hart, of Portland, was a victim of the Iroquois theater fire in Chicago. She was visiting in Chicago, attending the performance with a friend who was also trampled to death.

James Lynch, who was to have been hanged at Salt Lake City on January 8, for murder, has had his sentence commuted to life imprisonment for saving the lives of two prison guards in the recent jail break at Salt Lake.
