Gas Plant at Boise. Boise, Jan. 12 .--- C. J. Franklin ar-

lived from St. Louis yesterday to bework on the gas plant of the Boise Gas company, He has been sent by A. Ross, president of the company, who is secretary and treasurer of the Laclede Gas Light company of St. Louis.

In talking of the project last even-lng Mr. Franklin said his only work was that of construction. He would proceed at once with the plans and start the actual work so soon as practicable. The work has practicable. The machinery has been shipped, or would be in a day or two. He did not know about the piping, but he was in a position to say that every part of the work would be pushed ahead as rapidly as possible. It was the expectation of the company to be delivering gas by May 1, or by June 1 at the latest. "You may state," he said, "that we are prepared to do things."

Electric Road in Idaho.

Lewiston, Jan. 12.—Walter H. Hill, chief engineer of the Lewiston & Southeastern Electric railway, who is

in the city for a few days from the line, when questioned by a reporter yesterday, said that he had been getting along in fine shape with the sur-vey. In less than two months' time there has been over 60 miles of the preliminary and 12 miles of the location line run and the power site sur-veyed.
