GENERAL NEWS.

The gold output of South Dakota during 1903 was \$6,889,137.

Mexico has 11,185 miles of railroad—approximately one-tenth the mileage of the United States.

Ex-Governor Bushnell, of Ohio, is suffering at Columbus with a stroke of paralysis received January 11.

John Alexander Dowle left San Antonio January 11 for San Francisco, where he will embark for Australia.

Eight very large and entirely new sawmills are being built in California. The lumber output of that state is increasing rapidly.

The peoples' party national committee will meet at St. Louis February 22 to determine time and place of the national convention.

There have been wholesale arrests of students of the Warsaw (Russian-Poland) universities, and 350 have been handed over to the "faculty" court.

The Rock Island and Southern Pacific will expend \$1,000,000 on a causeway 2 1/2 miles long and 500 feet wide between Galveston Island and the mainland.

T. F. Porter, a Fresno printer, disappeared in 1897. His skeleton was just found in the Pacheco hills, near San Jose. It was identified by a pistol and bicycle.

An epidemic of smallpox threatens in Western and Central New York. In many places churches, dance halls, theaters and public libraries have all been closed by the authorities.

An organization of ex-union teamsters, survivors of the war of 1861-5, is being effected. It will petition congress for a horizontal service pension of \$50 per month for every man.

An unsuccessful attempt was made January 11 to assassinate Mrs. R. J. Anthony (Poll Pry) at Denver. She is a well known newspaper woman. She was shot at twice at her lodgings without effect.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

A Harika, a Jap. 26 years of age, has committed harikari, in Seattle.

The Methodists at Union have sold their church property to the Catholics.

Little Coyote, a Flathead Indian, was found dead in Missoula river at Missoula, Mont. Cause of death unknown.

The Blue Mountain Eagle reports 2,000 bushels of apples frozen in the big orchard of J. B. Rinehart, of Grant county.

A suit is to be filed against Malheur county to recover \$14,000 worth of warrants which the county court ordered cancelled.

An explosion in the Crow's Nest mine in British Columbia, killed seven miners. Fire damp prevented rescue work for some time.

Fred H. Hechler has been fined \$50 for killing elk near Wapinita. He got the minimum fine, as he claimed he thought it was a bear.

The reduction plant at Imnaha, in Walla Walla county, will be ready for its machinery about February 1. Some of the heavy machinery is now at Lewiston and some at Elgin.

Hobson's Mother Dying.

Denver, Jan. 12.—A special to the News from Boulder, Col., says the mother of Captain Richmond Hobson, the hero of Santiago harbor, is dying at the home of Shirley Davis, of Boulder, and her son has been telegraphed to come. Mrs. Hobson is 60 years of age and has been an invalid for 20 years.
