ROAD SUPERVISORS.

Appointment Made for Every District in the County and Bond Fixed.

The county court has appointed the road supervisors for the different districts and placed their bonds.

In former years the road supervisors of each county have been elected by the residents of the different districts, but at the regular session of the legislature in 1902, it was ordained that on and after the first of January of this year, all of the road offices in the state should be vacant and the county courts of the different counties should, at their January term, appoint men to fill the offices. In accordance with this law the court today fixed the bonds of the supervisors of the county at \$300 each, and made the appointments of the officers.

The men appointed are as follows: Uklah, Frank Hilbert; Vinson, J. N. Suiste; Willow Springs, Frank Jones; McKay, S. R. Yates; Hogue, A. G. Bohlts; Adams, C. C. Darr; Union, D. H. Nelson; Prospect, A. D. McCarty; North Athena, W. H. H. Scott; South Athena, Clark Walters; Echo, Frank Rack; Bingham Springs, R. C. Hager; Yoakum, B. Hopper; Yancy, E. O. Casey; Valley, Charles F. Weiss; Pilot Rock, F. M. Smith; Alba, Josh Clark; East Weston, Harvey Martin; North Milton, J. N. Baskett; South Milton, J. F. Campbell; Juniper, J. C. Prendergast; Mountain, Ed Fagin; Holdman, W. L. Purcell; Helix, J. K. Bott; Fulton, James Gugin; Cottonwood, J. W. Toner. The supervisors for Meacham and Gilliland have not yet been appointed.

At the session of the court in November it was ordered that the services of F. H. Beathe, of Weston, as county superintendent of roads, be dispensed with after the first of December, and since that time there has been no official in that position. It is not likely that the office will be filled before the opening of spring makes it necessary for the roads to be looked after. When that time comes a man will in all probability be appointed.

The court ordered that the road doled to the county in sections 33 and 34, township 6, north of range 35 east, by F. E. Labadie and others, be opened and made of use for the public of the county.

GALLOWS FOR EGBERT.

John Frost, Alias Egbert, Will Hang at Salem January 29.

Harry D. Egbert's name is John H. Frost, said Sheriff Allen at the Geiser Grand Hotel last evening to a Herald reporter. "He served his first term in the penitentiary of this state under the latter name and it is his true name."

Egbert, or Frost will hang at Salem January 29. The gallows is already constructed and the death watch has been set. It will be the first legal execution under the new law. There will be three electric buttons which will be pressed at the public execution. Three men will press these and as only one button connects with the wire that throws the trigger neither will know which was the cause of the execution."
