GENERAL NEWS.

The pawnbrokers of Lima, Peru, have formed a trust with \$1,000,000 capital.

J. R. Williams, a well known Idaho stockman, died January 11 at San Francisco, aged 73 years.

The government forces and the rebels are fighting in Uruguay. The war is a continuous program of guerrilla fights.

J. P. Gillan, while drunk, went to sleep on the street car tracks in Butte Tuesday night and had both legs cut off. He will die.

One hundred tons of human hair, valued at \$30,000 per ton, were imported, mostly from Europe, into the United States during 1902.

Leslie Collett jumped from a switch engine at Butte, Tuesday night, slipped, fell beneath the wheels and had both legs mashed. He will die.

Mrs. Ruth Brown Thompson, aged 76 years, eldest daughter of "John Brown of Osawatimie," is dying of the grip at her home in Pasadena, Cal.

The American Car and Foundry Company, of St. Louis, employing 5,000 men, has made a horizontal cut of 10 per cent in wages of all employees.

A juror in the Stockton, Cal., police court, was robbed of a \$200 diamond pin. The police force, many of whom were in the room at the time, are greatly humiliated.

A fund is being raised to provide temporarily for chorus girls stranded in Chicago by the closing of the theaters. Many of them will return to their homes in various parts of the country.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

John F. Damon, the pioneer city editor of the Morning Oregonian, died in Seattle Wednesday, aged 77.

The trial of David Van Houten, for the murder of Chas. Young, in Portland, two weeks ago, has been set for Thursday, January 28.

The Yakima county bar association has passed a resolution favoring the division of the state of Washington into two judicial districts.

Mrs. Catherine Costello, a pioneer of Portland, died Wednesday of heart failure, aged 71. She had lived for 40 years in the home in which she died.

William Harris, a noted negro rough of Portland was sentenced to 16 years in the penitentiary, Wednesday, by Judge Sears, of Portland, for robbery.

Miss Grace Bagwell, a beautiful belle of Sacramento, has been missing for several days and a bundle of clothing has been found along the river bank, indicating foul play.

The fire protection committee of Portland has accepted both the Marquam Grand and Cordray's theaters as being reasonably safely equipped, but has not yet completed its investigations in the other Portland theaters.

The scowhouse, moored on the Willamette river, near Fulton, in which Mrs. S. G. Cress lived alone, broke away from its moorings Wednesday, and through frigh, the woman leaped into the river and swam ashore as the scow started down with the current.

Multnomah politicians are still agitating the removal of Postmaster Bancroft, of Portland, for the alleged crookedness in his office, some weeks ago, and have already named two men, either of whom would be acceptable postmasters. They are John Minto and Senator J. E. Hunt.

HAPPENINGS IN THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST

For More Federal Districts.

North Yakima, Jan. 14.—The Yakima county bar association met here today, after a short session of court by Judge Rudkin, and took up the matter of a resolution relative to the division of the state into judicial districts. A resolution that had been passed by the association of Spokane was read favoring the division of the state into two districts, with the Cascade mountains as the dividing line. This resolution was endorsed by the aidma bar association and a similar one ordered drawn, incorporating therein the request that this city be made one of the places for the court to sit. The Yakima lawyers are opposed to a division of the state into districts. That is, to divide the state north and south, with a line through the center of the state. They believe that this may be good politics for Tacoma and Seattle people, but it is not according to the natural divisions of the state. A copy of the resolutions will be forwarded to the delegation at Washington.

New Brewery at Palouse.

Palouse, Wash., Jan. 14.—Work on the new brewery building is being rushed by a large force of carpenters. The frame is up and the rafters on and the work of enclosing the building began today. With the roof on and sides enclosed work can be done on the interior during cold or wet weather. It is hoped to have the brewery in operation by early spring. The new 150 horse power boiler of the electric light plant is being installed and will be ready for use by February 1. The electric light system is being extended to all parts of town and a large force of linemen are at work. Palouse now claims to be the best lighted town in the Palouse country, the city paying for 15 arc lights of 1200 candle power each.

Officers of Pullman Bank.

Pullman, Wash., Jan. 14.—The First National bank of Pullman held its annual stockholders' meeting today. The stockholders elected Levi Ankeny, B. Lombard, Jr., Gay Lombard, A. Cohn and Eugene Bryant directors. The directors elected Levi Ankeny president, B. Lombard, Jr., vice president; Gay Lombard, cashier, and S. G. Sargent, assistant cashier.

A dividend of 15 per cent was declared, making a total of 35 per cent for the year, a dividend of 20 per cent having been declared June 15. In addition to the dividend of 15 per cent the sum of \$7,000 was carried over as surplus.

Electric Power Along the Snake.

Pasco, Wash., Jan. 14.—Considerable interest is being aroused here now in the matter of utilizing the falls in the Snake, either at Fishhook rapids or Five Mile rapids to generate power for irrigation and lighting. People who have investigated the project say it is entirely feasible and that sufficient power can be developed to water several thousand acres. Water has already been appropriated at Five Mile and it is probable that an appropriation will soon be filed at Fishhook.

Boat Overturned, Boy Drowned.

Tillamook, Or., Jan. 14.—A boy by the name of Frank Fowler, aged about 12 years, was drowned in the Nestucca river and the body has not been recovered.

Frank was in a boat and the line, which was held by another boy, broke and the craft was carried some distance down the river, when it struck a rock and upset.

Fowler was thrown into the river and, there being a swift current at the time, was unable to get out.

Seven Warrants Sworn Out.

Ellensburg, Wash., Jan. 14.—The local W. C. T. U. swore out warrants for the arrest of John Zipperer, Humboldt Packwood, John Linder, Samuel Pearson, C. Z. Pearson, John Lyons and James Shaw for violation of the Sunday closing law last Sunday. The case came up before Justice W. W. Bonney and a change of venue was taken to the court of Justice James G. Boyles. No date has been set.

Fine Crop of Ice.

Palouse, Wash., Jan. 14.—A fine crop of ice is being harvested here and a large force of men and teams are employed in sawing the ice which is seven inches thick, and of good quality. About 1,000 tons of ice will be put up in Palouse. The ice is taken from the mill pond above the dam.

New Cars for Spokane.

Spokane, Jan. 14.—Spokane electric lines are doing considerable business with the J. G. Brill car factories at Philadelphia and St. Louis. Six cars from the latter factory of the company are expected this week for the Couer d'Alene line.

Organization of a New Industrial Trust.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 14.—Officials of the rail rolling mill companies of the United States are in conference here today with a view to bringing about a closer relationship among the various concerns. The mills represented at the conference are those located at Cambridge, O., Huntington, Va., Cumberland, Md., Fairmont, W. Va., Buffalo, N. Y., Clearfield, Pa., and Atlanta, Ga.

One of the principal objects of or-

ganisation is to save freights on both raw and finished material and buy rolling mills from all the railroads, selling the rolled rails to mines, mills, lumber camps, etc.
