To Have New Trial. "I simply killed a horse thief, that's all," said George S. Miller to a Herald representative before starting back to Burns for a second trial. "Colwell had nothing to do with it." The men look the worse after having served 20 months in the state prison, but the granting of a new trial gave them great hope and they willingly return to Harney county for trial. "It has been two long weary years," whispered Miller, "but my wife has stood by me as only a wife will. She has kept things going at our ranch down in Harney county and at the same time has given my case every moment's time that was required. It is through her persistence that the lawyers have kept at work in the case and finally secured a new trial. It is thought that the prisoners will take a change of venue from Harney county next trial and that Colwell will possibly get cleared and that Miller may get his case reduced to manslaughter and a lighter sentence. They were both up for life under the sentence just reversed.—Baker City Herald.

Good News for Lewiston. The telegram from Boise published in the Tribune yesterday morning announcing that the state land board had denied the application of the Idaho river improvement company for a river improvement franchise on the north fork of the Clearwater river, was read with much cheerfulness by the Lewiston people yesterday. All the independent mill men on the river joined in the movement, fully realizing what a monopoly of that stream by any concern meant. In all quarters the view is now held that no further attempts will ever be made to secure control of the North Fork, and all citizens now feel that the last menace has been removed to the establishment of big milling plants at Lewiston or at other points on the main stream. This means that the Clearwater will remain an open river and that large mills can with safety be established along the stream, free from interference by people who may ex-

pect to benefit by a political pull.—Lewiston Tribune.

Two Men Blown Up. An accident occurred at the mine of S. T. Culp, about 10 miles from Boise, last night that nearly cost two men their lives, says the Boise News. John Starkey, a resident of Boise, and another man whose name is not learned, were blown 40 feet by an explosion of giant powder and both are now in comparatively good condition, having received no permanent injuries. While closing their work for the day their tent caught fire, and the men were hastening back from the tunnel in which they had been working to extinguish the fire. When within six feet of the tent the explosion of 15 pounds of dynamite in the tent sent them 40 feet into oblivion. Starkey was badly cut about the left side of his face, a large gash extending over his eye and his cheek bone and ear being badly cut. His eyes are both swollen dreadfully and the sight of the left one is gone, although the doctor says that it may return if the concussion is not too severe. The younger man is not hurt to speak of, only a few bruises being sustained. He is deaf in consequence of the explosion, but will doubtless be all right in a few days.

Cancelling Old Taxes. The county commissioners have taken up the matter of cancellation of a large amount of delinquent taxes that are carried on the tax rolls for a period of years dating from 1878 up to 1902. The amount of the delinquency is about \$187,000. The board, with the assistance of Deputy Auditor John W. McGhee Jr., and Bert Painter, commenced work this morning of going over the rolls for the years mentioned and selecting what taxes they considered collectible, and entering the amount in a new tax roll. It will be turned over to the county treasurer with instructions to make the collection as soon as practicable. All that the board considered cannot be collected will be cancelled.—Walla Walla Statesman.
