GENERAL NEWS.

The three-story car barn and 50 cars of the Brooklyn Street Railway Company, were burned the night of January 14.

To avoid a second operation for appendicitis, George Storm, president of the Owl Commercial Company, of New York, committed suicide.

The National Business Men's League of Chicago indorses the agitation for a presidential term of six years, and prohibiting re-election.

The oldest bank in Arizona—the Internal Bank of Nogales—has closed its doors, compelled to do so by too heavy withdrawals of deposits.

James Doherty, delegate of the National Order of Hibernians, has been expelled from the order. The reasons therefor have not been made public.

Germany is having much trouble with one of her African dependencies—the Hereros tribe, who are scrapers and can put 30,000 men in the field.

Perry Heath is booming Hanna for president, through his paper, the Salt Lake Tribune. This will not weaken Roosevelt's prestige on account of the postal frauds investigations.

The internal revenue department has seized a large number of sets of valuable furs, recently arrived in New York City from Canada, upon which duty had been evaded.

The white people of Normal City, Ind., have ordered the 35 negro families of that city to leave at once. The latter declare they will not and are arming. Serious trouble is expected.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Spokane Opera Company is the latest theatrical organization in the Northwest.

Robert F. Hall, of Portland, has fallen heir to a \$50,000 estate through the death of an aunt in Connecticut.

The North Pacific Fair Association is now in session at Portland, arranging dates for the circuit next year.

Isaac Hughes, of Falls City, near Independence, died Friday from the effect of a gunshot wound, received while hunting last Monday.

It is now announced that Postmaster Bancroft, of Portland, will not be removed, although his action in using government money for private use by a serious offense.

George Cain, despondent because of illness, drank two ounces of laudanum at his home in Portland, Friday but by quick use of the stomach pump, his life was saved.

"Brick" Johnson, wanted in Walwola county for attempting to kill an officer, has been taken from Helena to Enterprise, by the sheriff of Walwola county. He was captured in Helena by the police force.

A wreck was caused to the "Owl" train of the Southern Pacific on Thursday night, by someone placing a telegraph pole on the track. The engine and tender were derailed, but no one was hurt, although there were 300 passengers on the train at the time.

Fred Stevens a delegate to the livestock convention in Portland, from Clackamas county, went to bed Friday night with the gas in his room blown out, but turned on full force. He was rescued before death came to reward his ignorance of metropolitan ways.

IN DISTRICT NO. 1.

Superintendent Nowlin Finds That the Proposed Four-Mill Levy Will Be Legal.

County Superintendent J. F. Nowlin has returned from a visit to district No. 1, at Pilot Rock, where there was trouble over the levy of a 4-mill tax for school purposes.

A. J. Sturtevant, one of the heavy taxpayers of the district, had filed objections to the levy, claiming that it cast all of the burden of the schools on the shoulders of a few, and that it was excessive. Mr. Nowlin made the trip to investigate the condition of things, and decide on the legality of the levy and the justice of the claims made by the petitioner.

It was found by Professor Nowlin that the schoolhouse in the district was old and worn out. It will be but a short time until it is condemned, and then the district will have to be bonded to raise money enough for a new house. The district is wide-awake and wishes to educate its children, and it is the misfortune of a few of the pupils in its environs to own most of the property, so that when a high levy is made, it falls heavily on the few, and for this reason the petition was presented.

It was found that the levy was regular in every way and that there was no grounds for complaint.

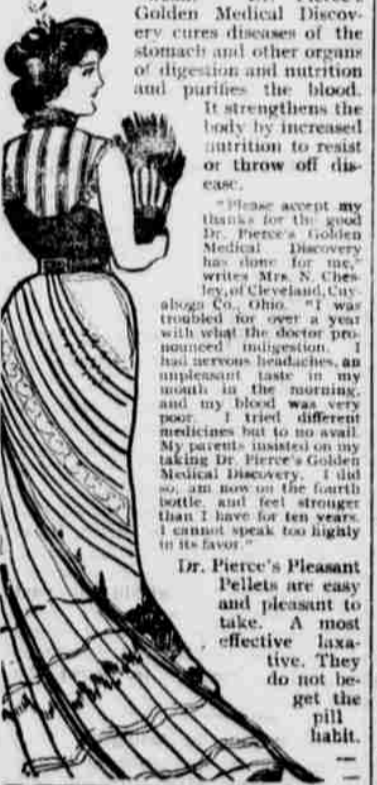
ATHENA SCHOOL TAX.

District Has Levied 15 Mills for Three Consecutive Years.

Athens, Jan. 16.—For the third successive year the school district here has voted a 15-mill school tax, for school purposes. The district has a bonded indebtedness of \$7,000, drawing 7 per cent interest, and it is the intention of the board to pay off \$1,000 of the principal this year, thus cutting down the debt to \$6,000 and secure a 6 per cent rate on that amount. The total funds raised in the district this year is \$6,493.50, and the total expenses are placed at \$5,651.
