FOR A NEW STATE

LEWISTON MAY BE CAPITAL OF A COMMONWEALTH.

Parts of Three or Four Western States to be Segregated and Made into One Great Empire With Lewiston as the State Capital—Natural Topography and Geography Favor it—Would be Wealthiest State in Northwest.

The Northern Idaho News, published at Sandpoint, Kootenai county, says:

"That man who desires to see a new state carved out of the western part of Montana, eastern Washington and northeastern Oregon, with the panhandle district of Idaho as the heart of the watermelon, may not be so far wrong, if at this time his plan may look visionary. There is no doubt that as the western country develops it will be found that the northwest is altogether too unwieldy to remain in its present topographical and geological boundaries.

An empire could be built, as this gentleman says, which would be cemented together by similar interests and made one by its resources of like nature. Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington have little in common with the sea coast portions of their respective states. Seattle and Bellingham bay are not interested in Spokane's mining interests; Portland and Salem are far removed from the irrigated portions of Oregon; Ravalli and Flathead counties in Montana are tired of assisting in putting up their share for the mining litigation of Silver Bow and Lewis and Clarke counties, and but for loyalty to a form, would greet the carving out of a new state with some degree of comfort, at least from a business point of view.

"In fact the matter of state division has been broached on several occasions in Montana, but always by the 'cow counties', as the eastern counties are called over there, which declare they have nothing in common with the mining counties of the state.

"The panhandle of Idaho is far from the state capital and its lumber and its mining interests make it have more in common with eastern Washington and the west end counties of Montana than with the agricultural

and grazing counties farther south. The new division, if it shall ever be made, would make the richest state in natural resources there is in the union.

"It would embrace the Couer d'Alene mining district free from that litigation which has made of the Butte mining district a load upon the necks of the other counties of Montana; it would embrace the lumber of western Montana and the Idaho panhandle, the richest timber belt there is left in the United States, and the Palouse country would give to it the finest agricultural area that lies out of doors.

"It would make by far the wealthiest inland empire that Uncle Sam could gaze upon when numbering over his treasures."

SHIPPING SHEEP.

Twenty Thousand Head of Muttons to Seattle.

James Wright, of North Yakima, is in the city today, overseeing the shipment of the sheep which he bought of Rugg Brothers about a week ago.

Mr. Wright is one of the most prominent sheepmen of this section of the country, and buys a great many sheep for the Washington market. He bought over 3,000 head of mutton sheep of the Rugg Brothers a week ago, and will ship a couple of cars to Seattle over the W. & C. R. this evening. Tomorrow he will go to Walla Walla, where he will make a shipment of three cars from that place to the Seattle market.

MONTANA MAN IN TOWN.
