Good Streets Cost Money.

Boise 1882 about \$20 each month to keep each one of the 29 blocks of asphalt and brick pavement of the city free from mud and other unsightly matter. And even then the pavement is kept none too clean.

Five men are constantly employed in the work of gathering up the mud and voidings, sweeping up the dust and carting off the accumulations. Every day and often far into the night Street Commissioner Lewis has the one garbage wagon owned by the city making the rounds of the paved streets, loading and hauling off the dirt and other accumulations of the streets.

One day last week, he states, ten big loads of refuse were hauled away, and the south side of Main street still remains so badly frozen that it is impossible to dig up the ice and other frozen refuse without doing serious injury to the paving that lies beneath.—Boise Capital News.

Wintering Stock on Straw.

Mr. C. C. Clark is wintering 450 head of cattle on straw and volunteer wheat on his and Judge Mariner's farms. So far he has fed no straw, the cattle doing well and even fattening on the volunteer wheat. The winter so far has been mild and moist, causing a good growth of wheat. The straw will only be used in case of snow covering up the wheat so that the cattle cannot feed on it. About half of the cattle are for beef and are taking on fat nicely from the volunteer wheat. There will be about 400 head of beef cattle in the vicinity of Blalock early in the spring belonging to the farmers in that locality and made fat on wheat that would otherwise go to waste.—Arlington Record.

Get Cheaper Coal.

As a result of the coal agitation, it seems likely there will be a reduction by the Short Line of \$1 a ton in freight. With that reduction and others that may be within reach the

price of coal should be brought down to \$8.50, if the matter be probed to the bottom.

We are now paying the 50 cents advance announced last fall by the coal mining companies. That was dropped off as to Salt Lake and should be dropped as to Boise. The coal would then cost laid down here about \$5 a ton. How much should be charged for delivery is a question about which dealers and the public may differ, but it is very plain to the average person that the price delivered should get down to \$6.50. If the railway cut off \$1, the mining companies and the dealers should cut off as much more.—Boise Statesman.

Heartless Dishonesty.

A farmer named Alexander appeared before the county commissioners today and lodged complaint against Edward Byrnes, whom he accuses of allowing his cattle to die of starvation. It is alleged that Byrnes, who is very wealthy, has a large band of cattle which he has turned out in the roads, and as there is nothing for them to eat they are dying very fast. Byrnes has only a small tract of land, and no pasture in which to keep his cattle. Instead of keeping them up and feeding during the winter he has let them run in the roads and rustle for themselves.—Walla Walla Statesman.

New School Law Satisfactory.

Wasco county will have at her disposal for school purposes this year \$6,822 more than would have been available had not the legislature at its regular session provided for the levy of \$6 per capita upon the school population in the counties, instead of five mills on the dollar as was the case prior to this year. The number of children in Wasco county between the ages of four and 20 years is 5,006, making the levy \$30,036 instead of \$25,034 as would have been the amount under the old law.—The Dalles Chronicle.

MOSELY REPORTS MARKET REVIEWED

AMERICAN EDUCATIONAL
METHODS SHOWN ENGLAND.

Commission Toured the United States Collecting History, Facts and Prospects of the American School System From One Coast to the Other—A Remarkable Private Enterprise.

London, Jan. 16.—Alfred Mosely, who has just returned from the United States, where he went to conduct the tour of the British educational commission, has sent to the English press a statement regarding the trip. Mr. Mosely does not give the results of the investigations of the commission, leaving that to the reports to be presented by the members of the commission themselves, but he takes occasion to give a general outline of the tour and to thank the educators and others in the United States for the kindness and courtesies extended to the Britishers. Among other things, he said:

"I have especially to thank Mr. Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, for the amount of work and forethought that he placed at the disposal of the commission by not only giving his own time and attention to the delegates generally, but for the tour that he marked out and arranged with such skill, covering the whole ground of education in the United States, and for excellence of the arrangements, whereby committees met at every point that we visited, with cut-and-dried programs as to what we were to see and how best to accomplish the work in the shortest space of time and with the least loss of energy."

Immense Amount of Data.

"I may say broadly, that there has been a vast amount of information collected which will be most interesting and valuable reading, not only to the educators of Great Britain and America, but to the public at large, whose interest in the value of practical education is now being aroused—and aroused, I venture to think, none too soon in view of the enormous developments that are taking place on educational lines in other parts of the world."

The British commissioners have been enormously impressed with the energy and public spirited attention that everyone in the United States pays to education. These conditions we found to hold true not only in the East, but also in the far Northwest in California and other sections of the country. Public money is lavishly spent, private generosity is poured out in a stream of millions that would astonish those unaccustomed with the facts, with the result that the youth of America is being equipped in such a way that he cannot fail to make his impression on the world and to render himself individually self-supporting and a credit to the nation."
