TOO-LA-LEET-LA HAS

BATS IN HIS BELFRY.

Is a Government Charge and the Question of His Disposal Is a Complicated One-Believed He Will Fetch Up in Government Insane Asylum in North Dakota,

The certificates of insanity in the case of Too-la-leet-la, the Indian gow confined in the county jail, were re-ceived this morning from the office of United States Attorney John H. Hall, of Portland.

The Indian was sentenced to the

county jall some months ago for the crime of larceny committed on the reservation, and since his incarceration has begun to show signs of insanity. Of late he has become ugly, as is usually the case with an insane Indian, and has given the jailer and the inmates of the jail much trouble. He poses as a human statue part of the time, and refuses to be clothed, wishing to revert to that state from

which his wild ancestors have sprung. He was examined a few days ago by Drs. W. G. Cole and F. W. Vin-cent, who found that he was suffering from homicidal mania, and at the time it was questioned what disposi-tion could be made with him. As he is a government charge he could not be sent to the asylum at Salem without a writ of transfer from the asy-
