



Question of One Cent Postage, Re ciprocity With Canada .and Ex. tension of Power to the inter. State Commerce Commission All Up for Discussion-Fifty Local Boards of Trade Represented,

Washington, D. C. Jan. 19.-The National Board of Trade began its thirty-fourth annual meeting here today. About fifty commercial bod-ies are represented by 150 delegates. The program of the meeting, which will occupy three days, contemplates the discussion of a wide range of subjects.

the Among many resolutions adopted by some one or another of the constituent bodies for discussion at the meeting are those favoring one cent postage for invoices; urg ing further trade-mark legislation to complete the participation of the United States in the benefits of the International Union for the Protec-tion o findustrial Property; favoring the granting of further power to the interstate commerce commission ic enforce its decisions, and favornig the inspection of grain by a national bureau.

Reciprocity with Cfinada is asked by commercial organizations in Bos-ton, Cincinnati and Pittsburg, Philadelphia. Scranton and Baltimore present resolutions favoring one cent postage.

Other subjects of discussion will be improvement of rivers, harbors and inland r vigation, projects, for navigable waters from the Great lakes to the Atlantic and the Guif Misaiasippi levee protection, free ship canal from Cheaspeake Bay to Delaware the river, currency changes, consular, reform, and the Panama canal,


