GENERAL NEWS.

Eight hundred hack and carriage drivers in St. Louis have struck for a 12-hour day, and \$12.50 per week pay and 25 cents per hour for overtime.

Harry S. Huff is dead at San Francisco. He was an interpreter and could speak more Chinese dialects than any living man, Caucasian or Mongol.

Alterations to make their buildings conform with the law, will cost Chicago theater managers \$500,000. This is entirely outside the cost of rebuilding several.

The courthouse of Adams county, Colorado, burned January 15. Loss, \$40,000 on the building. All the records were burned, including the completed assessor's returns.

Miss Fannie McNabb, of Chicago, has been sent to an insane asylum, the victim of cigarette smoking. She is said to have smoked a package every day for 10 years.

John Oldham, a Utah mining millionaire aged 72 years, on 10-days' acquaintance married Jennie O'Neill, a 20-year-old penniless chambermaid, first transferring to her a large amount of his property.

The North Yakima theater has been ordered supplied with a new exit as it was considered to be dangerous by the fire committee of the city council.

Two highwaymen held up a saloon at Tenth and Glisan streets in Portland at 11 o'clock Wednesday night, securing between \$5 and \$6 from the cash register.

The accommodations committee for the Lewis and Clark fair in Portland, has already secured over 1,200 rooms that will be available for guests during the fair.

The Ministerial Association of Spokane, has begun an active crusade against the immoral women of that city, and will subpoena the police to testify against the women.

"GRANDMA" BANKS DEAD.

Pioneer Woman of Athena Passed Away at Her Home Yesterday.

Athena, Jan. 21.—Mrs. H. Banks, an old pioneer of this city, familiarly known as "Grandma" Banks, died yesterday evening of paralysis.

She was buried here this afternoon, her funeral to be the first one preached in the Y. E. church.

She leaves nine grown children, five of whom are married and are present at the funeral. She was 74 years of age, and was one of the most highly respected pioneers of the county.

LABOR TROUBLES AT BAKER.

Hotels Are Placed on the Unfair List by the Cooks and Waiters.

Owing to some difficulty with employees, the Sagamore and the Packwood hotels, of Baker City, have been advertised as being on the unfair list, and union people were warned against eating, sleeping or drinking there.

The Baker City Herald, in commenting on the situation, says: "The Herald called on W. W. Lake, secretary of the Cooks' and Waiters' Union, this morning, and asked for an explanation. Mr. Lake stated that the hotels were still in bad repute with the Cooks' and Waiters' Union and that they would continue to boycott the places until the matter was settled."

"He said that the grievance against the Sagamore is the employment of Chinese cooks and the proprietor has indicated that he will try to get white labor and is willing to pay the union scale of wages. "But he claims that the man at the Packwood will not pay union wages. While the wages of the union here are comparatively low the Packwood man refuses to pay the sum."

UTAH AT ST. LOUIS.

Pitchblende Has Been Discovered in Utah and Specimens Will be Exhibited at the World's Fair.

Utah's state building at the world's fair is finished and was turned over to the commissioner January 1.

pects to start an entire train load of articles for exhibition. Every kind of grass and grain grown in Utah will be exhibited and 6,000 pounds of honey will be shown. A large amount of fruits and vegetables have been placed in preserving liquids and will be displayed in the palace of agriculture.

Utah's mining exhibit is expected to be one of the most interesting made by any state. Specimens of ore from the various mines of onyx, marble, decorating and building stone will be shown. A miniature concentrating plant is nearly finished and will be one of the interesting features of the mining section.

Large deposits of pitchblende, from which radium is obtained, has been discovered in Southern Utah and large quantities of this will be shown.

TYPHOID EPIDEMIC

IS DUE TO POLLUTION FROM HEPPNER FLOOD.

lone and Lexington, Not Heppner, Are Affected — Condition Exists, Though Local Authorities Are Reticent — Eleven Persons in One Family Were Sick — Sanitary Fund Was All Expended on Heppner.

For some time reports have come out of the Heppner valley to the effect that there was an epidemic of typhoid fever at Heppner, but the efforts of the health authorities have been unavailing in determining the extent of the sickness.

The cases have been confined to lone and Lexington for the most part, and the spread of the disease and the number and seriousness of the cases have been kept a secret by the local authorities as far as has been possible. The state board of health has heard of the condition of things there, and asked that Dr. Smith of this city make an investigation, but owing to pressing business here it has been impossible for him to make the trip, and it is thought that the conditions have changed a little for the better by this time.

The epidemic is traced directly to debris of the Heppner flood, which left the valley strewn with the contents of the water-closets of the upper valley and the city of Heppner, dead animals and all sorts and conditions of filth and refuse washed down and mingled with the silt of the stream. This has lain through the summer and now is being mingled in the water used by lone and Lexington.

Heppner is free from the disease, owing to the fact that added by the funds furnished the city by outside sources it was cleaned and purified. The committee having the funds in hand refused to allow the money to be spent on the places lower down the creek, and as a result they are now paying the penalty of the flood.

In one family in lone not long ago there were 11 persons sick with the fever at one time. This ratio shows the prevalence of the disease.

Why Ship Cattle into Oregon?

What is the matter with Oregon cattle raisers, anyway? J. P. Philman, of this city has gone to Omaha to buy beef for the Union Meat Co., at Troutdale. Is it possible that Oregon cannot supply meat enough for local markets? Or is it that the trust has such a perfect organization that beef can be shipped from Omaha to Troutdale at a profit in competition to local growers? The fact that Mr. Philman is buying meat in Omaha for the local markets is cause for Oregon cattle raisers to put their thinking caps on.—Times-Montaineer.

Inducement for a Railroad.

The Crook County Journal estimates that 10,000,000 pounds of freight was hauled into Prineville from the terminus of the Columbia Southern during the year 1903, and this is only a part of the incoming freight to Crook county. The Journal makes a very good showing of the amount of traffic that country offers to a railroad that will invade its territory.—Antelope Herald.
