FOR BETTER ROADS**OVER \$24,000,000 FOR
ROAD IMPROVEMENT FUND.**

Oregon's Share in This Fund Would Be \$250,000—Intention of the Bill is to Build From 100 to 500 Miles of Model Country Roads in Each State.

There is a bill introduced in congress by the Hon. Walter P. Brownlow of Tennessee, and the Hon. Jacob H. Gallinger, member of the senate from New Hampshire, appropriating \$24,000,000 on the part of the national government—as national aid in building wagon roads. This money is to be apportioned among the states according to their population, except that no state shall receive less than \$250,000.

Each state receiving national aid from the government must add a like amount to the sum received. This will, therefore, cause the spending of \$48,000,000 for roads and will build from 6,000 to 7,000 miles of splendid road and will place in each state from 100 to 500 miles of fine hard road, which will not be affected by frost or spring rains and on which the farmer can haul the year round.

It will be a great advantage to those living near it, but it will be a far greater advantage to the whole country because it will be a wonderful object lesson and will prove to everyone that a good, hard road which can be used the year round, no matter what the rains are, is a good and desirable thing; it will make everyone who sees this road and who uses it want more roads just like it to be built.

While under the Brownlow bill the building of 6,000 to 7,000 miles of splendid road is a great thing, yet it seems to many that the greatest advantage of this bill is the wonderful object lesson which 100 to 500 miles of fine road will produce when built in every state of the Union.

Oregon's proportion of the fund if the bill should pass, would be \$250,000. The state receiving the greatest amount would be New York, whose proportion would be over \$2,000,000.

Alberta Gallatin in "Ghosts" Tonight.

The San Francisco Call speaking of Ibsen's "Ghosts" which comes to the Frazer tonight says:

In the face of Christmas festivities and the general good cheer and happy feeling that should be the year, it was surprising to note the size of the audience at the Mason last night to witness a performance of Ibsen's "Ghosts" by Alberta Gallatin and her capable company. That there was a fair-sized house must be taken largely as a tribute to the reputation of this sterling actress, though a few in it may have been allured by the title—as was one woman, who asked at the box office if this was a Christmas pantomime and whether or not Mr. Ibsen was a good actor.

"Ghosts" is not a play calculated to attract those who like those features which are the very life of the modern "popular" drama. There are but five characters; there is no flashy costuming; there are no spectacular stage settings. It might just as well be enacted in the sitting room of an ordinary house.

While immoralities, or rather dissipation are the background of the piece, and are frequently discussed on the stage, there is nothing in word or act that should offend the most fastidious. "Ghosts" is a problem play in that it deals with matters that have been for centuries problematical, conditions that mankind has brought about by its desire to escape conventional environment or to enjoy itself at the expense of consequences.

The play "Human Hearts" is said to be a strong plea against conviction for crime on circumstantial evidence. It details the story of a murder and shows with what ease such

evidence can be twisted around by unprincipled schemers and an innocent man made to suffer for the wrong doings of another.

Tom Logan, a dweller in a small village in the heart of the Arkansas hills, falls in love with and marries an adventuress, who, when she tires of him, with the assistance of a former lover, succeeds in fastening the crime of patricide upon him. He is convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment on manufactured evidence, and might spend the rest of his days in prison, were it not for the fact that a tramp, who had witnessed the murder, finally turns up and clears him by his belated evidence.

"Human Hearts" is said to be a play of strong interest, enlivened by plenty of true, wholesome comedy and a drama well worthy of the attention of the most critical. It is being presented under the management of W. E. Nankeville, who promises a worthy setting and a first class company.
