GENERAL NEWS.

Five cloakmakers of New York, employing 2,000 hands, have granted their employees' demands, thus averting a strike.

It is alleged that one of the richest gold deposits ever struck in the Southwest, was found lately in the Santa Rosa district, Arizona.

Norman Selby, (Kilo McCoy) the pugilist, has gone into voluntary bankruptcy, alleging that his liabilities are \$25,246 and his assets \$150.

A New York bank will loan the Chinese government \$1,500,000 on the security of the output of the Ham Yang iron mines, and at 6 per cent interest.

E. E. Plough and M. H. Kelly, of Spokane, claim to have invented an engine which by the simple manipulation of a lever can be transposed from a locomotive to a stationary engine or vice versa.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Norman Patterson, a pioneer of Colfax, died Saturday, aged 73.

An elegant new high school building costing \$35,000, was dedicated at Eugene on Saturday evening.

Petitions for the primary nomination amendment are being circulated in all the Willamette valley towns.

George Gamble, of Portland, has taken charge of the fine stock on the Oregon experimental farm at Union.

Grant's Pass has passed an ordinance closing all saloons, card games, cigar stores and billiard parlors on Sunday.

The Grand Ronde Lumber Company, of Perry, will get out logs for 12,000,000 feet of lumber in this season's run.

Three Greek laborers were instantly killed in a rear-end collision, near Ogden, Sunday morning, between a gravel train and water train.

B. L. Cappell, a returned Nomen miner, committed suicide at Seattle Saturday night because friends censured him for his continuous drinking.

Engineer Ladner and Fireman Elmley were killed by a runaway train of coal on the Canadian Pacific, near Revelstock, B. C., Saturday night.

Belvie Elliott, a young girl of Albany, became stage struck Saturday and started for Portland to go on the vaudeville stage. She was intercepted at Lebanon and returned to her parents.

The Indrasahma, one of the O. R. & N. steamers, arrived at Portland Saturday, 34 days from Manila, with the Philippine exhibit for the St. Louis fair on board. The general cargo consisted of matting, tea and silk.

O. R. & N. CORN CROP

INTERESTING REPORT MADE BY GOL. R. C. JUDSON.

The Total Area of Corn in Umatilla County This Year is 8,000 Acres—Largest Yield on the Farm of T. J. Kirk, Was 35 Bushels Per Acre—Largest Crop This Year Was 140 Acres Owned by Charles Brotherton Near Athena.

The following interesting article from the report of R. C. Judson, industrial agent of the O. R. & N., on the corn crop of the Inland Empire will be read with pride by the citizens of Umatilla county.

Umatilla county is the parent corn district of the Inland Empire. The first small beginning having been made near Athena five years ago, with seed furnished by R. B. Miller, general freight agent and R. C. Judson, industrial agent of the O. R. & N.

The report of Mr. Judson on the industrial department of the O. R. & N. is an interesting little volume and should be read by every farmer and stockman in the state. A copy of it can be obtained by mailing a postal card to R. B. Miller, general freight agent O. R. & N. or R. C. Judson, Portland. Mr. Judson's report on "Corn" is as follows:

"Some five years ago in our institute work, we advocated the raising of corn upon summer-fallow land, claiming that it would not take any more work to cultivate the corn than it did to summer-fallow and would be as effectual in destroying the weeds. Some small fields were put in, in the vicinity of Athena, Weston, Walla Walla, and Garfield.

Those that cultivated their fields well were pleased with the results, and put in increased acreage, and the result was good yields. As the corn was purchased at our seed stores, and the farmers put in what came handy, I was instructed to purchase some different varieties of seed corn and distribute it among the farmers along the lines of this road.

Agreeable to instructions, I purchased a quantity of seed corn in North Dakota that would "rip" in 90 days, and of a good variety. I secured some eight kinds of tested corn, and while all proved a valuable acquisition to that grown, the corn that proved the best was the Dakota Yellow Dent. It was found to be the earliest and the ears, while of good size, were hard and firm.

The largest field of corn that was grown in 1902 was that grown by Mr. W. J. Wilkinson, Athena, Oregon, who put in a field of 226 acres. He reported the yield at twenty-nine bushels per acre, and the cost up to husking time no more than it did to summer-fallow the land. This was a valuable experiment and means much for our territory.

The largest yield this year was that of the field of Hon. Thomas Kirk, of Athena, who raised 35 bushels per acre, but he cultivated the corn three times, instead of twice, and secured the increased yield. I show a photograph of his field, showing the corn. You will note that while the stalks are short, the ears are large.

Among the others that grew corn near Athena, Oregon, were Chas. Brotherton, 80 acres; Charles Wilcox, 140 acres; Robert Coppeck, 40 acres; there were many others, and a large number in the vicinity of Weston, in the aggregate sum 8,000 acres were put into corn the past year tributary to Athena and Weston.

Quite an amount was put in in Walla Walla county, some 2,500 acres in Whitman county, and a large acreage in Spokane county, and as the demand for corn is increasing yearly, the home market taking what is offered for sale, I look for increased acreage in the future.

Again, when the farmers begin to save their earliest and best ripe ears for seed, and take more pains in cultivating, much larger yields and much better corn will be the result.

Now here is something raised where nothing was raised before, and I feel especially grateful to those farmers who have made it possible to show that corn can be grown at a profit in the summer-fallow. I also feel very grateful to the press for their efforts to help in the experimental work, and I hope that it will only be a few years before Eastern Oregon and Washington and Western Idaho will be known, not only as the wheat country, but a corn and livestock country second to none."

EASTERN OREGON GRANGES.

Two Active Branches in Both Gilliam and Umatilla Counties.

The two branches of the Grange in Umatilla county now have a membership of about 100, and are both in a highly prosperous condition. New members are being added all the time and a public installation of officers will be held in the near future.

There are two other branches in Eastern Oregon, both being in Gilliam county. One of them has been organized for about eight years, having withstood the crash of the Farmers' Alliance and Grange several years ago, the other was only organized two years ago, and both are in a flourishing condition. The membership of the two branches amounts to over 100.

Further organizations will be made in Eastern Oregon this season. The farmers in different portions of the state are inquiring about the organization and several branches will probably come into existence this year.

The Grange is very strong in Western Oregon, there being over 100 lodges with about 5,000 active members. They conduct stores, shops, warehouses and different industries on the co-operative plan and are eminently successful.

The only authorized organizer of the order in Eastern Oregon is J. Clem of Freewater, who is a deputy organizer and will make an active campaign through the eastern counties this year.

Mr. Clem moved from Willamette Valley to Umatilla county in October, 1902 and has been very active in promoting the order in this portion of the state.

UNION COUNTY EXPENSES.

Total Expenditures for the Year Amounted to \$53,000.

La Grande, Jan. 25.—County Clerk J. H. Minnaugh has just completed a statement of what it has cost to run the different parts of the county government during the year 1903, and according to this statement it is found that it amounts to \$53,133.25, and average of \$4,427.77 per month, or about \$148 per day.

The salaries of county officers not including the expense of county court amounts to \$17,571.03. The expense of the county court is divided among the salaries of judge, commissioners, bailiffs, livery, expediting books, etc., and amounts to \$2,640.

The item of roads, highways and bridges is a heavy one in this county. The cost of bridges was \$6,607.77, roads and highways was \$11,942.97, which in all amounts to \$17,550.74, and this is quite an item of itself. The care of poor including salaries of county physician, poor farm, provisions, transportation hospital charges, building etc., amounts to \$3,430.76.

The justices courts, including fees of justices, constables, jurors witnesses, etc., feet up a total expense of \$1,955.85.

Other items included are the school expense of the county offices, election, etc.
