AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Testing charity of Walla Walla.

Abraham Khatter, a native of Syria, is in the city soliciting funds for the erection of a Roman Catholic church in his native land. For many years his people have suffered untold outrages at the hands of the Turks and they are striving for the spread of Christianity to put an end to these outrages.

Mr. Khatter bears an indorsement from the United States consul at Beirut over the consular seal, testifying to his upright character and the authority to solicit funds for the purpose he states. He said yesterday:

"The Christian religion has but little place in the land of Mohammedans and oppressions at the hands of the Turks have horrified the world during the past few years. The Syrians especially have been very harshly dealt with and any assistance that can be given the propagation of the Christian religion in that land will assist in diminishing the outrages with which the people have long been cursed.—Walla Walla Union.

New Hay for Grant County.

J. A. Steach, who recently returned from Kansas, brought back a sack of sugar cane seed and will sow part of it to hay. Mr. Steach says sugar cane is getting to be popular here in the Mississippi states. It is sown broadcast and sufficiently thick to make the stalks grow fine. It flourishes on dry land and all kinds of stock are said to do well on it. Mr. Steach will distribute some of it among his neighbors and it will be tried on various kinds of soil. If this proves a success and grows and yields as many claim, it will be a great thing for some of our farmers whose fields are on high, dry ground.—Grant County News.

MARKET REVIEWED

EGGS DROP FROM FORTY TO THIRTY-FIVE CENTS.

Ranch Eggs Are Coming in in Great Numbers and the Price Will Go Still Lower—Apple Market is Rather Strenuous—Fresh Vegetables Are Going to Make a Winter Run.

Fresh ranch eggs have dropped from 40 to 35 cents within the last two days. On Saturday night, the prevailing price was 40 cents, with eggs very difficult to get at that price, while today finds baskets brimming full, in most of the stores with prices market down to 35 cents.

Saturday and Monday brought in a large supply of fresh eggs from the country and as the weather has been unusually warm for the past few days, the country hens are limbering up and the prices will surely be down within reach of the breakfast table again.

Apples are not very plentiful and are retailing at \$1 per box. Some very fine apples are to be seen in the markets and the anticipated shortage has not been felt.
