These three envelopes were then placed in a larger envelope and sealed and a wax seal placed on the flap and delivered to the chairman of the committee, M. A. Rader, to keep until the day the buggy will be drawn. The remaining seven envelopes containing the other numbers were then burned in the presence of the committee, thus insuring an absolutely unknown number.

Upon the day when the envelope is to be opened and the buggy awarded to the person guessing nearest to the number, the numbers will be assembled in the order in which the envelopes are marked. It may be as low a number as 012 or as high as 987. As a matter of course, it must be three different figures, as no figure was used twice. Somebody will get a receipt \$100 present when the 975 receipts have been given out. The unknown numbers will be

formed by putting together the numbers in the order as marked, two, three, on the envelopes on which they are contained. The unknown number will not be assembled until the guessing contest is complete, hence no one will know what it is until it is publicly announced to subscribers.

Limited Competition. The number of receipts in this contest will be limited to a number of guesses possible in a range of the numbers between 012 and 987, as the unknown number must be composed of a figure within those limits. The unknown number cannot be less than 012 nor more than 987.
