## PETTY THIEVERY

STEALING GOING ON IN ALL PARTS OF THE CITY.

Chickens, Clothing, Fuel and Everything Else Movable Disappears—Very Few Clues to the Perpetrators—Something Will Be Doing Before Long, as the People Are Becoming Aroused.

For some time there has come a cry of petty thievery from all quarters of the city, and the police have been kept busy chasing down thefts and rumors of thefts, but in spite of their diligence no one has been caught, and there is never a clue as to who the guilty parties may be.

Charles Bean, of the Boston Store, lost a bundle of clothes from the hallway in the East Oregonian building, where he has apartments, Monday night. Henry Harrison is also out a few shirts and things from the same place.

Henry Thompson, who lives but a few blocks from the center of the city, was a short time ago the proud possessor of 22 chickens of a fancy breed, and in the number were 13 young pullets. One morning Mr. Thompson woke up to find the 13 young chickens gone, while the old members remained.

Edgar Thompson, in the same neighborhood, is out a couple of tons of coal, and J. W. Privett has also had coal stolen.

From these amounts the thefts scale down to cans of coal oil, a few sticks of firewood, umbrellas, over-shoes, or anything left loose after dark.

The vanishing acts are not confined to one portion of the city, but are reported from all sides, and are laid at the door of an organized band of petty larcenists by some, and charged to the account of some kind neighbor by others. The police are inclined to cut out the band proposition, and accuse both transient thieves and neighbors.

Several days ago a merchant noticed that his wood was melting away too rapidly, and remembering that it cost nearly \$9 a cord, consulted with the officers. He was advised to watch, as it seemed to be a regular dwindle, and accordingly sat up in the woodshed one night. Near the hour of 12 he turned the electric light on one of his near neighbors, who was out foraging for dry kindling wood, and since that time has had no trouble with his wood pile. Others are in the same class it is thought, and other men are keeping their eyes on the back yard after dark, but the sleight of hand performance still goes on.

### TAUGHT FIFTY YEARS.

Iowa Educator Been in the Harness Half a Century.

Cedar Falls, Ia., Jan. 29. — Fifty consecutive years as a teacher is the record achieved by Prof. M. W. Bartlett, of the Iowa state normal school, and today faculty, students and alumni of the school united in paying tribute to the venerable educator in celebration of his golden jubilee. The greater part of the day was set aside for the celebration and addresses were delivered by prominent educators and others. The address of the day was delivered by President Thomas McClelland, of Knox College, who was a pupil of Prof. Bartlett nearly a half century ago.

Prof. Bartlett was born in New Hampshire in 1834. He was graduated from Dartmouth college, and for a time taught in the country schools near his home. He came to Iowa in 1857 and became an instructor in Western College. For a few years he was president of the institution. From Western College he went to Denmark Academy, and later spent three years in a private school in Missouri. In 1876 Prof. Bartlett accepted a position on the first faculty of the Iowa state normal school and has been with the institution ever since. For many years he had charge of the department of mathematics, but recently he has been instructor of English.
