

CATTLE AT LAST ARE ADVANCING IN PRICE.

Only Stall-Fed Animals That Bring the Top of the Market, and They Can Be Depended Upon to Do it-Prices Range From \$4 Down to \$3.25 Depending Upon the Character of the Feeding and General Care Taken of the Stock,

The cattle market has begun at last to rise, for the dealers will now admit that the time has come when they are able to pay 4 cents steers that have been stall-fed for some time prior to the date of sale Yesterday one large sale was made in the vicinity of Pendleton at 4 cents, and more will be consummat-ed in a short time, but in all of these cases the cattle have been put into the Jeeding yard early in the winter, and kept there until they are in the best condition that good feed and plenty of it will put them. The great trouble and the thing that makes the cattle situation at this time a little twisted, is the inability of the grower to see anything inferior in the stock that he pro-duces. He thinks and clings to the idea that his beef is just as when it has been on the stubble field and straw stack diet for the whole winter as the other fellow's that has stood next to the feed box for several months. If they were able to see the difference there would be no misunderstanding tween the man who buys and the one who sells.

The market then ranges from \$3.25 for the lower grade of marketable steers to \$4 for the best of the stall-fed cattle, and the cows will bring about the same price that has been quoted


