## DECENNIAL CENSUS

### JOB AHEAD OF COUNTY ASSESSOR IN 1905.

Particularly Arduous Duties Devolving Upon Assessor of Umatilla County—Multnomah County Will Have Forty Deputies—Enumeration of Statistics Required is Given Below in Part.

The county assessor of this county, whoever that may be, will have a busy time of it when elected to serve the next term. Aside from the regular work of the office, he will have to make a census of the county, as provided by the state law.

Every 10 years the assessors of the different counties in the state are required by law to take "an enumeration of the inhabitants and the industrial products" of their respective counties, the work commencing on March 10. The last time this was done was in 1895, which will bring the next census in March, 1905.

Umatilla county's assessor will not have as easy a time as some of the assessors in the state, for his work will lie over scattered territory—through the mountains and out on the ranges, where the people are shifting from place to place and conditions are ever changing.

In Multnomah county it is estimated that the work will require the services of at least 40 deputies, and

there the property, products and people are all bunched where they can be easily reached. In Umatilla county six or eight men will have to do the work, searching for their data among the hills and mountains, and sage brush of the plains.

The taking of the census requires a great deal of work. The assessor must ascertain the number of legal voters in the county; the number of males who are of age, the number under 10 years of age, and the number between 10 and 21; the number of females who are of age, the number under 10 years of age, and the number between 10 and 18; the number of acres under cultivation, the number of bushels of wheat, barley, oats and rye raised during the preceding year, and similar information as to the production of hay, sheep, hogs, salmon, etc.

When the assessor has completed his census he sends it to the county clerk, who makes a copy, and then transmits the original to the secretary of state.

## FOR NEW SCHEDULE

### PENDLETON COMMERCIAL ASSOCIATION GETS BUSY

Monster Petition Asking for Change in Time of the Arrival of Branch Train No. 41, at Pendleton, Will Be Presented to Superintendent O'Brien — Committee Begins Circulation of Petitions—All the Country Towns Are Taking Active Interest.

The committee consisting of Albert Cohen, Robert Forster and E. P. Dodd, appointed by the Commercial association to circulate petitions asking for the change in the time of the arrival of the mixed branch line train No. 41, on the O. R. & N., to an hour not later than 1 p. m. to accommodate the residents of Umatilla county in coming to Pendleton, their county seat, began active work this morning.

Two petitions were prepared and a large number of signatures of business men secured today. The matter will be pushed energetically this week, in order that the monster petitions may be presented to Superintendent J. P. O'Brien at the earliest possible date. Petitions from Weston and Athena are expected to arrive every day and Agent E. C. Smith now holds one from Adams which will be sent to Mr. O'Brien as soon as those from Athena and Weston arrive.

The Commercial club recognizes necessity for quick action in this matter, as it has been brought to the attention of the business men of Pendleton, that many citizens of Umatilla county living along the branch line have been attracted to Walla Walla, by the superior train facilities of that city.

Residents of Athena, Adams, Weston, Milton and Freewater are taking an active interest in the matter and it is believed that a sufficient showing will be made to the officials of the O. R. & N., to warrant them in making an immediate change in the schedule of the train.

At the present time this train arrives at 2:35 and owing to the lateness of this hour it is impossible for people coming to the county seat to transact their business before the departure of No. 42 at 6 p. m.

The O. R. & N. has never denied Pendleton any reasonable request in the past and the Commercial association hopes to see the fruition of this effort in a short time.

Fully one-half the population of Umatilla county patronizes the branch line and if the schedule does not meet the general needs of the community, it demoralizes business.

It is possible that a regular passenger train running between Pendleton and Walla Walla, near the present schedule of the mixed train, will be discussed with the company, if such an arrangement would be more convenient to the company than to change the time of the mixed train.

The petition to Superintendent O'Brien is as follows: "To J. P. O'Brien, superintendent O. R. & N.:

"We, the undersigned residents and business men of the city of Pendleton, in behalf of the citizens of Umatilla county residing along the branch line of the O. R. & N., between Pendleton and Walla Walla, respectfully request that the time of the arrival of train No. 41, at Pendleton, be changed from 2:35 p. m. to an hour not later than 1 p. m., in order that the citizens of the county, extensively patronizing this branch line, may come to Pendleton, their county seat, and principal trading point and transact their necessary business in the afternoon in time to return home on No. 42 at 6 p. m.

"We respectfully represent that this branch line is patronized by a large proportion of the population of Umatilla county, and that the present schedule of train No. 41 is inconvenient and unsatisfactory and is causing many citizens of Umatilla county to go to Walla Walla as a trading point, owing to the greater conveniences afforded by the train schedules for that city.

"We feel that it is necessary for the O. R. & N. to change a main line freight train schedule to provide better facilities for residents of Umatilla county in reaching their county seat, that the past records and future business prospects of the O. R. & N. in Pendleton and tributary territory would justify such a change."

#### GOOD WHEAT PROSPECTS.

J. Keller Reports for the Vicinity of Adams.

J. Keller, a farmer of Adams, was in the city today for a short visit. Mr. Keller is one of the large wheat-raisers of the county, and is much pleased with the prospects of a good crop this season. The rain has been plentiful and the ground is now in the best condition for fast growth. Last year, owing to the lack of moisture, though the grain was good, the straw was so stunted that in some parts of the county it was impossible to save the wheat. This year the indications are for a good growth, and consequently a larger harvest.

#### BANK'S MISTAKE.

Dead Man's Money Sent Here Without Authority.

The coroner is up against it in the disposal of the effects of John T. Brown, who suicided here a few days ago. The Rexburg bank has sent \$85, comprising all of the money de-

posited by the dead man in the bank, to the First National Bank of this city, and no one has authority to withdraw the amount. The Idaho bank had no right to send it here, for no one beside the administrator of the estate of the deceased has authority to move his money.

In the will left by the dead man this amount was to go to his mother in Iowa, and it will doubtless be sent there, but first an administrator will have to be appointed to look after the property and make his report.

#### WORKED THE WRONG CRANK.

New Weatherman Hasn't Got the Hang of the Machine.

Pendleton has a new weather man and today was his first day on the job. As a result it rained and the wind broke the record of some months. F. G. Mitchell, of the drug firm of Brock & McComas, received his appointment as local weather prognosticator this morning from District Forecaster Edward A. Reals of Portland, and as soon as he had the authority, went to work to give Pendleton a spell of weather. By some mistake he got hold of the wind crank while searching for the handle to the sun, and the dust-storm was the result. The only way to stop the dust was to turn on the rain, and Mr. Mitchell did that. From this time on, however, he promises to give Pendleton the best in the barrel.

#### SUIT AGAINST FIRST NATIONAL.

Seeks to Recover \$22,150 With Costs and Disbursements Added.

Antonius Vey has filed a suit in the circuit court against the First National Bank, in which he seeks to recover a large sum of money alleged to be on deposit and withheld by the bank.

The plaintiff alleges that since May 1, 1898, and prior to January 31, 1904, he has put on deposit sums aggregating \$64,372.59, from which he has withdrawn \$42,023.59, leaving in the bank the sum of \$22,150. This sum is withheld by the bank from the plaintiff, and it is to recover that the suit is brought. He asks the amount with costs and disbursements of the action. Balleray & McCourt are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

#### PECULIAR ACCIDENT.

Rolling Horse Breaks Small Boy's Thigh Near the Hip.

Fred, the 3-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Andrews, of Echo, was brought to the hospital today. Several days ago the little fellow was playing about a gentle horse in the barnyard. The animal was lying down, and while the boy was standing close to it, commenced to roll and in threshing about a hoof struck the boy on the right thigh, near the hip joint, fracturing it badly. The bone was set, but owing to the location of the hurt the condition of the boy is serious, and he was brought to the hospital.

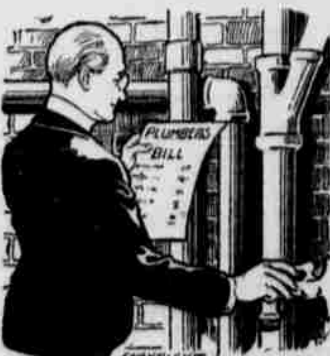
