Pioneer Express Carrier. Mr. Frank McBean, of Canyon City, arrived on the stage this evening, says last Friday's Granite Gem. Union up Against it. The case of William D. Benson, the barber who persists in running his shop after union hours, presents some strange features. A committee from the trades council is busy investigating the situation. Benson is not working any of his union employees longer than the regulations of the union allow. The rules of the barbers are that shops can run from 7 in the morning until 7 at night and until 11 on Saturday nights. Benson is running his establishment from 6 in the morning until 8:30 at night and until midnight on Saturday. He works the extra hours himself and as he is a boss he is not allowed to be a member of the union. The question which the trades council is investigating is whether a man who is not allowed to be a member of the union can be forced to work only as the union shall dictate.—Spokane-Review.
