GENERAL NEWS.

The president will name the isthmian canal commission immediately upon the ratification of the treaty.

A shipment of 1,500,000 bushels of first-grade anthracite coal has been started from Pennsylvania points to Russia.

Fifteen persons were killed in the wreck February 8, near Ottawa, Ontario. The accident occurred in a blinding blizzard.

The Baltimore fire has forced the United Society of Christian Endeavor to seek another place for the coming national convention.

Willie Hoppe, the American billiard expert, has won the international championship at Paris, defeating Vinjeaux and Sanchez.

The banking firm of Stephen Leuhman & Son, of Bremen, has failed with liabilities of \$1,500,000. Several New York firms are affected.

The four principal baseball organizations of the United States incorporate 168 clubs, employing in the aggregate 2,500 first-class players.

Nineteen carloads of China silk, weighing 1,000 tons and valued at \$2,000,000, has just arrived in New York over the Canadian lines via Vancouver.

Now it is denied that Russia is trying to raise money by foreign loans, or that she has tried to, and it is claimed her domestic resources are ample.

The board of United States general appraisers has decided that duty cannot be charged on pulp wood from the province of New Brunswick.

February 8 the wind on that section of the Canadian Pacific which crosses the Rocky mountain divide, blew 70 miles an hour for 24 hours, with the mercury 20 degrees below zero.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

J. H. Miner, a pioneer miner of the Black Hills, died at Butte Wednesday, aged 85 years.

Insurance rates on vessels flying the Japanese flag have raised 10 per cent in all Pacific coast ports.

The Knights of Maccabees will build a two-story building at Roseburg this season, to cost \$15,000.

Captain Pleasant C. Nolan, a pioneer of Lane county, died at his home in Eugene, Wednesday, aged 74 years.

Ethel Crusan, a 13-year-old girl, who eloped from her home at Eugene last week with a worthless vagrant, has been found in Portland and returned to her home.

During the month of January 938 applications for relief were made to the Portland board of charities, and the board paid out a total of \$959.35 for relief of the poor.

The Washington Home Company, of Spokane, similar to the Fraternal Homebuyers, is also under the ban of the postoffice department and cannot send its advertisements through the mail.

An unknown man, without any means of identification upon him, committed suicide at Woodburn Wednesday, by taking laudanum. He had failed to secure work and was dependent.

Three spiritualists who have been holding "table rocking" seances in Corvallis, have been ordered out of the city by a committee of citizens who fear a repetition of the "Holy Roller" craze.

The large tannery which has been operating at Eugene, for several years, has been forced to seek another location on account of the scarcity of tan bark there, and also because of the exorbitant freight rates out of that point.

HARDWARE HIGHER

ADVANCE ALL ALONG

LINE FEBRUARY 25.

Nearly All Manufactured Goods, Including Brass Lines Will Cost More After That Date — Some Progress Making in Relation to Change of O. R. & N. Timetable.

T. C. Taylor returned this morning from a visit to Portland on business. He went to the city Sunday in order to head off a rise in nails and barbed wire, which on Monday took a jump of 10 cents a hundred pounds. Mr. Taylor was in the office of a wholesale house in Portland Monday morning just closing his deal for large shipment of nails and wire.

Builders' hardware, such as locks, hinges, bolts and building material of all kinds known as classified hardware will be raised about 20 per cent on the 25th of this month, about the only thing in the hardware line not advanced being the raw material, such as bar iron, strap iron and other material of a like nature. Brass goods will also be higher in a short time.

Relating to Timetable.

While in Portland Mr. Taylor called at the office of Superintendent J. P. O'Brien of the O. R. & N. in relation to the petition for the change in time of the Walla Walla train which was sent into that office the latter part of the week, but Mr. O'Brien was not present. F. F. Wamsley, however, has promised to represent the conditions to the superintendent and do all in his power to secure a favorable action for this city.

TWELVE YEARS FOR RAPE.

Benjamin Wiseman Sentenced at Walla Walla.

Walla Walla, Feb. 11.—Unless the state supreme court shall decide that Judge Brents made an error in instructing the jury in the Wiseman rape case, which was tried at the last term of the superior court, Benjamin F. Wiseman will serve a sentence of 12 years, at hard labor, in the state penitentiary for the crime of rape, committed upon his 13-year-old niece, whose father is blind and whose mother washes for a living. Wiseman's crime was peculiarly atrocious and revolting. He had maintained criminal relations with the child for two years, or since she was 11 years old, under the threat that he would kill her if she reported him.

Wiseman is an ignorant laborer, and public feeling toward him is exceedingly bitter.

BANK STOCK ASSESSABLE.

Judge Brents Holds That Claim of Indebtedness is Futile.

Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 11.—Bank stock is assessable, although the holler claims indebtedness, according to the decision of Judge Brents, of the superior court. Four years ago Anna Elliott commenced an action against the county treasurer to prevent him from collecting taxes amounting to \$110.16, due on bank stocks.

As a cause of action she alleged that she was indebted to the extent of \$19,000 which should be considered as an offset against her tax on bank stock. Judge Brents holds that the tax was valid, and that no offset should have been allowed; that the tax can be collected with 15 per cent interest and the costs of action.

WOMEN WOULD VOTE

PERSISTENT REFORMERS

IN ANNUAL CONVENTION.

Headed by Susan B. Anthony, 80 Years of Age — This is the Thirty-sixth Annual Meeting of the National American Woman Suffrage Convention — Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt is the President.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 11.—Battling on for the cause which they have made their life work and neither disheartened nor discouraged by opposition or defeat, the members of the National American Woman Suffrage association assembled in Washington today and began their thirty-sixth annual convention. Enthusiastic and aggressive as ever, despite her four-score years, Susan B. Anthony leads the host, ably assisted by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt of New York, the Rev. Anna H. Shaw of Philadelphia, Harriet Taylor Upton of Ohio, Kate M. Gordon of Louisiana and others who have attained national prominence as leaders of the equal rights movement.

During the last year woman suffrage amendments were defeated in Kansas, New Hampshire and Wisconsin, and in fact, the movement cannot be said to have made any material progress anywhere in the country. The fight has been waged steadily, however, and the national association has returned to the charge unflinched by the reverses which it has met. Year after year the leaders of the movement have appeared before congress and appealed for the enactment of the law which would give women equal suffrage rights with men. There will be a similar hearing by congress next Tuesday, but with a prospect of better results than in the past.

During the present convention, which will be in session a week, an

afternoon and evening will be devoted to Colorado speakers. Woman suffrage has been tried for ten years in Colorado and some of the foremost women of the state have come to the convention to tell how it has worked.

The convention was formally opened today in National Rifles Armory Hall. With Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt presiding. Addresses of welcome and responses, reports of officers and appointment of the usual committees occupied the initial session. During the remainder of the sessions there will be general discussions on various features of the suffrage movement and addresses by prominent suffrage leaders, philanthropists, sociologists and others.

Between sessions the many delegates will be treated to an elaborate program of entertainment. Among other features there will be a reception at the White House by Mrs. Roosevelt and also a reception at the home of Miss Clara Barton.

SNOWSLIDE BURIES CATTLE.

Fear That Wyoming Farmer Has Also Been Killed.

Jackson's Hole, Wyo., Feb. 11.—Tom Estes and W. V. Giltner have arrived here with a report of a snowslide occurring on this side of the mountains a few days ago, which buried the ranch of Gus Koerner and killed cattle in large numbers.

It is believed that Koerner perished but nothing can be done until spring to recover the body, as the ranch is under 30 feet of snow and rock. The slide was over half a mile in width.
