Conner, a prominent Lapwai Indian, and a noted Presbyterian worker on the Lapwai reservation, died while visiting with her father in California last week, and will be buried at the Presbyterian cemetery on the Umatilla reservation this afternoon. Remains arrived from California last evening. While Mr. Conner is a Lapwai, the mother and two daughters are allottees on the Umatilla reservation, and for this reason the daughter is brought here for burial.

Badly Damaged Shoulder. M. J. Monteith, of Albany, accompanied by W. J. Raymond, was the guest of his cousin, Mrs. Caspar Van Dran, at the Pendleton yesterday. Mr. Monteith was injured in the overturning of the Willowa and La Grande stage some three weeks ago, having all of the ligaments of his left shoulder torn from their fastenings. He was able to put on his coat this morning for the first time since the accident.

Sumpter Valley Improvements. Baker City, Feb. 10. — President David Eccles of the Sumpter valley has gone to Tacoma, where he expects to receive from a German vessel soon to arrive there, a large consignment of material for the extension of the Sumpter Valley this year. Two large round houses will be built, one at Sumpter and one here, and several miles of track will be laid this season.
