

TAX ROLL COMPLETE

LIST FOR 1904 NOW
IN HANDS OF SHERIFF.

Total Amount of Taxes for 1904, \$224,185.14—Poll Tax Amounts to \$1,000—City Taxes for the Entire County, \$11,068.37, and School District Tax \$27,968.97—County Treasurer Will Call in Warrants.

By working over time both night and day, A. C. Funk, of the sheriff's office, and B. B. Hall, of the clerk's office, have been able to get the tax roll of this year ready and it will be in the hands of the sheriff for collection on Monday morning.

The books have been balanced though the districts have not as yet been segregated, but that is the work of a short time and the people will be given a chance to get their 3 per cent rebate from Monday on until the middle of the next month.

The poll tax for the county this year amounts to \$1,000 flat. The general state and county tax calls for \$184,149.80, the special school district tax will bring in \$27,968.97 more, the city taxes will yield \$11,068.37, making a total of \$224,185.14.

Last year the total tax was approximately \$158,284, which will be seen is much less than this year. This is partly due to the increase in state tax, which was greater on account of added and unusual appropriation by the legislature, and also to the \$6 per capita school tax law, which will raise about \$10,000 more for the school fund than did the old method of levying the tax.

As soon as the tax money begins to come into the treasury, County Treasurer E. J. Sommerville will call in the outstanding warrants of July and August of 1902, and will perhaps be able to make other calls in the near future.

GAMBLERS FRIGHTENED.

NEW DENTAL PARLORS.

Drs. White and Mann Form a Partnership in the Profession.

The Collier room is being fitted up for a reception room while his private office will be used for a convalescent and consultation room.

In the Mann apartments will be four operating rooms, the mechanical department and the laboratory. The reception room will be papered in maroon with green burlap wainscoting, and the woodwork throughout will be finished in white enamel.

All the machinery will be operated by electricity and a storage plant to provide a day current is now being put in. The new dental parlors will be opened to the public in a short time.
