GHANEY ACCIDENT

11-YEAR-OLD BOY'S NECK WAS INSTANTLY BROKEN.

Son of Well Known Dairyman Was Run Over by Six-Horse Team and Heavy Wagon—Was Also Cut Somewhat by Barbed Wire—Victim of a Peculiar Accident.

The remains of Harry Chaney, who was run over by a water wagon on the Chaney ranch yesterday afternoon, were brought into the city last night to the Baker & Folsom undertaking parlors, where they were embalmed, and will be taken to McMinnville in the morning for burial by the side of another brother, who died some years ago.

The accident happened about 1:30 yesterday afternoon. The boy, who was about 11 years of age, started to the field with his father, Charles Chaney, who was ploughing. Mr. Chaney was driving a six-horse team hitched to a water wagon, and was accompanied by a hired man who was leading a three-horse team.

On the way to the field the boy got off the wagon and was standing by the side of the road looking at a small washout. One of the horses led by the hired man, became tangled in a loose strand of barbed wire, and the team started to run. Mr. Chaney, seeing that his horses were about to be tangled in the wire, started his team on the run down the hill, and his son, while running from the first team, got in front of the wagon, was struck by the leaders and six horses and the wagon passed over him. The barbed wire struck him in the forehead, cutting a deep gash over the eye, and also breaking his neck.
