PLOWING IN PROGRESS.

Umatilla County Wheat Land Now in Excellent Condition for Farming.
Although there has been an unusually heavy rainfall in Umatilla county this winter, the wheat land in the wheat belt proper, is in excellent condition for plowing and a great amount of winter farming is being done.
Some of the farms in the heavy foothills land are too wet, but most of the great wheat belt is in prime condition. One feature of the soil in this county is that as soon as the rain stops falling, the top of the ground settles down at once and there is little or no mud to hinder travel or farming.
Plowing is now in progress more or less in every portion of the county and by the time the snow is gone from the valleys further east in Oregon, Umatilla county crops will have all been seeded and many of them growing.
